Simplified Richardsonian Romanesque in style. Note center frontispiece with corner turrets, patterned stonework, and entrance recessed within triple bynian arches on granite columns. Bell chamber is surmounted by clock stage with cut corners and short octagonal spire. One of the tower's corner turrets is extended as a chimney stack.

This courthouse is locally significant as the historical focus of county government, and of the political power and prestige derived from the community's status as the county seat. As center of county government, an Iowa town was reasonably assured of economic and population growth, and a prominent role in local social and political life. The county courthouse represents a significant public investment in a structure built not simply for utilitarian purposes, but also as a monument associated with the historical importance of county organization and development.

MARION COUNTY

In 1845, when Marion County was organized, it had a population of less than 1,500 people. Because the first settlement was only two years old and quite small, the county could not afford to build a proper courthouse. For a little over a year, the county officials had to keep their records and conduct their business at their homes or boarding houses. There were problems with this situation and in 1846, the board of commissioners authorized the taking of bids for the erection of a frame building to be used as a courthouse. The accepted bid was for \$450, which was very reasonable considering that the wood for the framework had to be hewed from a forest with a broad-ax and transported a great distance. The final total cost, which included plastering and some other work on the inside, was about \$700. This building, located across from the northwest corner of the square, was used for 12 years as a courthouse, school, and church. It was later sold for \$928 in June, 1864, and used as a business and dwelling until being torn down.

The second courthouse in Knoxville, built in 1857, cost about \$20,000. It was a 48 by 70 foot brick building of two stories on a stone foundation. It stood in the center of the public square with offices on the first floor and the courtroom on the second floor. This courthouse was a very fine one in its time and stood for about 40 years. In 1895 the building was vacated because of its dangerous condition, and the county officials took temporary offices in some rented rooms.

The present courthouse was completed and accepted on December 30, 1896, at a cost of \$80,000. Made of stone, it is a three-story structure with a tower containing a clock which could be heard to strike the hour throughout the whole city at the time that it was built.
