DESCRIPTION</p>	<p>ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT CONDITION: Victorian Cottage; one story high, side hall, five room irregular plan, truncated hipped roof with gables, two interior chimneys, front porch, wood frame construction, on brick pier foundation infilled with brick at a later date, sheltered with weatherboard and covered with pressed metal shingle roof; detailing includes eastlake bracketed porch with pendants, Eastlake woodwork on porch posts and balusters; vergeboards and rectangular louvered vents in gable peaks, as well as boxed cornice returns; grounds are open with some grass and a few large trees in the back yard, house sits toward the front lot, situated in residential area where homes are rapidly being converted to law offices; fair condition</p>

AREA(S) OF SIGNIFICANCE: History, Architecture LEVEL OF SIGNIFICANCE: Local                  STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): <u>History</u>: This house is significant as it was built for Charles E. Turner, a clerk for a Broad Street Wholesale and retail drug concern known as "Brannan and Carson Co." <u>Architecture</u>: This house represents numerous early 20th century homes which incorporate old and new styles. With 1/1 sash windows giving a "modern" look, the house borrows the traditional Columbus truncated hip roofline, as well as the popular Eastlake porch turnings and vergeboard.</p>
