7. Description

The Church of the Brethren is a gable-roofed structure, erected in 1888 of native rough-cut stone, laid in random course. Surrounded by large cottonwood trees, the church has retained its picturesque rural setting. It is located near the small community of Hygiene and is 3/4 mile west of Longmont. To the rear of the church, and across state Highway 10, is a small cemetery where many of the early members of the congregation are buried.

The building consists of one room, with the formal entrance located on the south gable end. The entryway is arched and consists of a double door with transom. There are five evenly spaced windows placed on the east and west walls. The bays are flat-headed, with wood lintels and sills.

A frame lean-to addition was built across the rear (south) wall to be used as a kitchen.

The interior is plain, reflecting the austerity characteristic of the sect. Walls are plaster and the floors are hand-hewn pine boards.

Also included in the nomination is the historic cemetery associated with the church. Pioneers and early settlers of the Hygiene area are buried there—some of whom include members of the Brethren who built the church. The cemetery is divided by Colorado Highway 10 into two parcels. The northwestern section, located directly behind the church, is 1 1/2 acres and contains about 600 graves, some of which date to the early 1870s. (The land for the church and cemetery was donated to the Church of the Brethren by George and Lucinda Mason in April 1879). The southwestern parcel consists of one acre of land and contains about 400 graves. It was donated to the Pella Cemetery Association in 1879. The two cemeteries were independent of one another until 1945 when both the Pella and Hygiene Cemetery associations merged.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Located in rural Boulder County, the Church of the Brethren at Hygiene is an important remaining example of vernacular stone construction. It also represents the oldest surviving house of worship constructed in Colorado by the Church of the Brethren, formerly known as the German Baptist or Dunkard sect.

The Church of the Brethren is a Protestant denomination which originated in Germany in 1708. The doctrine, similar to that of the Mennonites, involves triple immersion baptism—hence the origin of the name "Dunkard." Followers of the faith were forced to flee to Holland after the Treaty of Westphalia, ending the Thirty Years War. By 1729, the last remaining members had emigrated to Pennsylvania, at the invitation of William Penn. Alexander Mack, founder of the Dunkards, settled in Germantown, Pennsylvania, where the mother church was founded.

The Dunkard faith was brought to the St. Vrain Valley in Colorado in the 1870s by a group of German descendants from Pella, Iowa. They established the small community of Pella, Colorado, where the first Dunkard church was organized by Reverend J. S. Flory in 1877. The following year, Flory moved one-half mile distant where he helped found the community of Hygiene, as well as the Church of the Brethren. The church was completed in 1880 at a cost of \$2,000. By the 1890s, members began to leave the Hygiene area and regular services were discontinued in 1907.

Today the church is used as a community center by the Hygiene Cemetery Association for weddings and for annual meetings of the Northern Colorado Church of the Brethren. Ten organized Churches of the Brethren remain in Colorado. (The largest congregation is in Rocky Ford, having a present membership of 296.)

Constructed by settlers of German descent, the church displays the heritage of its builders. The masonry, the semicircular arch above the front entrance is reminiscent of the Pennsylvania tradition of vernacular stone construction and can be seen elsewhere throughout the country--illustrating a continuum of German influence in construction methods and styling.
