Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Willard-Clark House is a two-story frame, asymmetrical plan, three bay residence built in 1886 and remodeled into its present Classical Revival design ca. 1910. The house retains much of its original 1886 detailing with the ca. 1910 remodelings consisting primarily of paired pedimented porticos on the main (south) facade. The porticos have full height fluted wood columns with Ionic terra cotta capitals. At the eaves and gables are wood modillion blocks and dentils and in the gable fields are round vent windows.

The house has a brick foundation, gable roof of composition shingles, interior brick chimneys, and weatherboad siding on the main facade. Side and rear facades have aluminum siding added in 1983. At the rear of the house is a one and one-half story frame ca. 1910 addition with two-over-two sash windows. Also at the rear is a one-story porch enclosed in 1983. Windows on the original section are paired one-over-one sash with pedimented hood molding. The main entrance has an original door with paired glass and frame lights and a single light transom. The original porch on the second story main facade remains and is recessed back from the added ca. 1910 porch. This original porch has milled cut out panels in the railing and is now supported by metal rods attached to the porch ceiling. This porch is reached by an original glass and frame door identical to the door on the first story. On the fascia board of the ca. 1910 porch is a Greek fret band. At the eaves of the original section are paired brackets.

The interior of the house has not been altered and retains its original four panel doors, staircase with fluted newel post and round fluted balusters. Mantles in the main rooms are simple in design with fluted pilasters. At the rear is a one-story frame garage and and a one-story shed built ca. 1930 with added metal siding. (NC) (NC) The house is sited on an urban lot in a residential section of Maryville.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Willard-Clark House is significant under criterion C as an unusual example of the Neo-Classical style of the early 20th century. The house was originally built in 1886 but was remodeled into its present appearance ca. 1910. This remodeling resulted in a large two-story portico on the main facade with Ionic columns and is unusual in its design with two interconnecting gables. It is one of the most imposing Neo-Classical designs in the county and its double gable design is unmatched.

The original residence at this location was built in 1886 by B.F. (Frank) Willard on his large farm which was then on the edge of Maryville. In addition to his farming interests, Willard also was manager of a saw and plane mill in Maryville. His home was a large two-story T-plan residence with a two-story porch with milled columns and railing on the main facade. The house was sold by the Willard family in 1903 and in 1905 it was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. J.L. Clark. Clark operated a well known dairy on the farm and served as manager of the Maryville Electric Company and around 1910 the Clarks added the large two-story portico on the main facade. This addition took place during the popularity of the Neo-Classical style and the full height columned portico reflects this style. The porch addition has been attributed to local builder Charles H. Young.

The Clarks resided in the house until 1929 when the house and adjacent farmland was purchased by Elmer L. Hudson. Hudson subdivided the property and developed the subdivision known as Sunset View. The house itself was sold in 1931 to Granville R. Swaney. The Swaney family owned the house until its purchase by the present owners.
