## **Description**

The house located at 818 South 1st Avenue was constructed in ca.1885. The builder is unknown. The building is of vernacular design with Victorian Gothic style influences and represents the Mass Vernacular property type. It retains integrity of design, materials, and workmanship. It was moved to its present location prior to 1942 and is currently vacant. Its original location is unknown.

The 818 South 1st Avenue House is located in Block 20, Lot 15-16 of the Montgomery Addition. The Montgomery Addition was originally platted in 1887. The building faces east onto South 1st Avenue. The streetscape along South 1st Avenue is characterized by modest, working class residences of both historic and contemporary construction. No outbuildings are located on the site.

The 818 South 1st Avenue house is a rectangular, one-story building of wood frame construction. The building measures 20 x 24 feet. The gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. It has a wood foundation. The building features wide shiplap siding.

Exterior features include a hip roofed veranda with square wood posts supported by a wood porch deck. Four openings are located on the principal facade. Three are covered with plywood. An off-center entry has a late flush wood door. Important architectural elements include boxed comice eaves, a frieze board and porthole ventilator at the gable head. The porch posts are detailed with crown molding at the capitals and support craved, bracketed corbells which in turn support the porch beam. Doors and windows feature wood casings with comice molding.

Alterations include a historic addition to the rear. The house is in fair condition, but has been susceptible to deterioration due to lack of maintenance and occupation.

### Statement of Significance

The house located at 818 South 1st Avenue is significant under Criteria C under the area of significance of Architecture. It is representative of the historic context "Residential Architecture in Phoenix Prior to 1901." Built in ca. 1885 and constructed of vernacular design with Victorian Gothic style influences, this house is representative of the Mass Vernacular property type.

A common design format for residences built in Phoenix during the nineteenth century was the Mass Vernacular house. Those building efforts were based, not on architectural design, but on the shared cultural experiences and abilities of their builders. Built of machine made and commercial materials, the houses often took into account past or contemporary trends in architectural style, although manifested in very simplified or provincialized elements. The house located at 818 South 1st Avenue exemplifies that type of residential architecture and illustrates a locally very rare, traditional design based on the influences of the Victorian Gothic styles. The common characteristics of the mass vernacular house type are well represented in the house at 818 South 1st Avenue and include an overall rectangular plan with a steeply pitched side gabled roof, a facade length veranda, and the use of dimensioned lumber and milled weatherboard. Building elements and details influenced by the

# **Statement of Significance (Continued)**

Victorian Gothic modes include the boxed eaves with cornice molding, overstated porthole attic ventilators at the gable heads, crown molding at the window and door heads, and jig-cut brackets at the classically detailed wood porch posts. The house is a rare and a significant local example of a vernacular cottage with a higher than average degree of attention to detail and workmanship.
