

#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The church complex of St. Mary's of the Purification is located in the small unincorporated village of Marystown, four miles south of Shakopee in Louisville Township. The surrounding area is primarily agricultural. The complex of four church-related buildings (church, school, rectory, and convent) makes up a large part of the settlement.

St. Mary's Church was built in 1882 to replace earlier stone and log churches. It is of rubblestone construction and designed in the Romanesque mode. The building is a hall-type parish church designed on the Latin cross plan. It has an intersecting gable roof and rudimentary transepts. A spire and cross cap the roof of the entrance tower. The hooded round windows, pointed spire, and distinctive rubblestone construction are the building's most striking design features. The interior of the church was destroyed by fire in 1917 and remodeled at that time.

St. Mary's School is located just south of the church and was constructed in 1893, replacing an earlier frame school building. The two story red brick building is set on a limestone foundation. It is three bays across and four bays deep and has a hip roof with a slightly projecting central pavilion. Contrasting yellow brick arches decorate window and door openings. Double windows flank the central pavilion on both floors. All windows are double hung with four over four lights. A small arched window is centered in the gable. The central doorway has been partially bricked over and turned into a window. One second floor window on the south side has been enlarged to a doorway, and an exterior stairway has been added. A two story red brick section was added on the north side of the building in 1935 and now houses the entrance and stairwell.

The church rectory, located north of the church, is a two story red brick residence constructed in 1910. It has a square plan with a hip roof and dormer facing the street. The five bay house has a central hall and full front porch supported by columns. Large five-part windows flank the doorway. A bay window is located on the south side of the building on the first floor. A frame garage has been added to the rear of the building.

The two story frame Sisters' Convent was constructed in 1921 and is situated back from the road, west and south of the other buildings. The large building is sheathed with narrow siding that has been painted white. It has a hip roof with exaggerated gables on each facade. The building is designed on a square plan. It is five bays across and has simple decoration. The front porch is original, but was enclosed in recent years.

Lesser buildings located on the property include a frame garage northeast of the convent, a small frame pumphouse southwest of the rectory, a heating plant west of the school, and a small brick building southwest of the church. The church cemetery is behind the church.

All of the buildings are well maintained and in use. The church and rectory continue their original functions. The school is now used as a meeting place and community center. The convent is leased as a residence.



### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The church complex of St. Mary's of the Purification is significant as a well-preserved complex of church-related buildings associated with the German population that settled the north, central, and western regions of rural Scott County. St. Mary's was organized in 1855 as the first parish in Scott County. The town was laid out and named for the church shortly thereafter in a pattern that was repeated in all regions of the county during the subsequent ten years. Small Catholic settlements such as St. Mary's were the primary centers serving surrounding rural communities. These small hamlets and the rural areas surrounding them are the most ethnically homogeneous parts of Scott County. The four buildings comprising the St. Mary's complex were constructed at intervals during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries as the community grew and needs changed. Marystown remains a thriving, closely knit, viable, German community, with approximately one hundred families in the parish today. As a center continuously uniting and serving the residents of Marystown and the surrounding area and as a representative of the Catholic hamlet type of settlement in the county, the St. Mary's complex is worthy of preservation.
