

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The S. Pressly Coker House is located at 402 West Home Avenue in Hartsville. Constructed in 1917, it is an excellent example of eclecticism, and illustrates the successful blending of elements of both the Shingle and Colonial Revival styles with the form and massing of the bungalow. This house is also representative of residences in Hartsville associated with the community's industrial, commercial, and civic leaders.

This two-story shingle-clad residence has a rectangular plan, with a three-bay facade, a lateral gable roof, and an engaged one-story portico which extends and wraps to the west as a porte cochere and to the east as a screened side porch. The portico, porte cochere and side porch are supported by a combination of Doric columns and wide shingle-clad piers. The symmetrical three-bay facade has two paired windows, each of which has eight-over-one double-hung sash with paneled shutters, and the central entry features a single-leaf twelve-light door with a simple surround and leaded glass sidelights. The second story features a shingle-clad shed roof dormer with two paired eight-over-one double-hung sash windows with paneled shutters, and a central eight-over-one double-hung sash window with leaded glass sidelights similar to those at the entrance. One of the two interior corbel-capped chimneys is at the ridge of the roof, while the other is on the rear slope.

The central hall features a three-landing stair with unturned balusters and French doors. Other interior elements include plaster walls, hardwood floors, Colonial Revival mantels, overmantels, crown moulding, and built-in bookcases and cupboards with both Colonial Revival wooden traceried doors and Craftsman or Mission Style leaded glass closures.

Two small and deteriorated outbuildings -- a wooden shed and a cement-block dairy -- do not contribute to the historic character of the property.

The S. Pressly Coker House is significant as an excellent example of Craftsman-influenced residential architecture and for its association with S. Pressly Coker (1887-1953), prominent Hartsville agriculturist and businessman who was a plant breeder with the Coker Pedigreed Seed Company and later founder and president of the Humphrey-Coker Seed Company and the Hygeia Dairy.

The house was designed for Coker by the architectural firm of Casey and Fant, of Anderson; other South Carolina designs by Joseph Huntley Casey (1875-1928) and Charles William Fant (1886-1956), many of them ecclesiastical projects, included the Hartsville Methodist Church (1921), the parsonage for the Anderson First Baptist Church (1917), St. John's Methodist Church in Rock Hill (1923), the John C. Calhoun Hotel in Anderson (1924-25), and Thomas C. Smythe Dormitory at Presbyterian College in Clinton (1924).

Samuel Pressly Coker, son of Edward Thomas Coker (1850-1933) and nephew of James Lide Coker (1837-1918), was a native of Society Hill, in upper Darlington County; he studied dairying at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, where he graduated in 1908, then studied plant breeding at Cornell University, where he received a graduate degree in plant genetics in 1911. He came to Hartsville soon after graduating from Cornell to work as a plant breeder for his first cousin David R. Coker (1870-1938), first with the farming operations of the J.L. Coker Company and with the Coker Pedigreed Seed Company after it was founded in 1913. Pressly Coker did "most valuable work" for Coker Pedigreed Seed Company according to his cousin David R. Coker, but left in 1918 to pursue work as an independent seed breeder. He founded the Humphrey-Coker Seed Company in 1920 to develop, produce, and sell his own pedigreed seed, and was widely considered an expert on seed breeding, serving as president of the Darlington County Agricultural Society in 1928-29. Coker owned and operated the Hygeia Dairy and the S.P. Coker Cotton Gin and was also active in civic affairs, serving as director of the Hartsville Chamber of Commerce and as a trustee of the Hartsville school board from 1920 to 1932.2
