This one-story frame rectangular-shaped, 19th century rural professional office building in the Eastlake manner is sheathed with clapboard and covered with a standing seam metal roof supported by a stud frame truss and sits on stone piers which are concealed It is two bays wide and three bays deep and measures by tin sheets. approximately 39 x 15 feet. The gable ends are covered with wooden shingles in alternate rows laid with staggered butts and the ridge is perpendicular to the facade. The building features a front porch with turned columns and millworked wood decoration, stained and frosted glass windows, built-in book cases and a teller's cage. Essentially the building has not been altered. The teller's cage was added in the 1930's. The concrete porch and brick dados on the exterior and the linoleum flooring and wall paneling on the interiorwere added in the 1960's.

The Law Office of Governor Albert H. Roberts is a well preserved example of a typical late 19th century country town professional office building. Built in the Eastlake manner, the elaborate wood detail and millwork evidence the first imported building materials from the shops of nearby cities made possible by the extension of railroad lines. The scale and form of the structure are indicative of the first urban fabric of late 19th century rural towns of America.

Roberts rented this office from about 1901-13. He practiced in Livingston until he became Governor of Tennessee from 1919-22. He is best remembered for the Good Roads Project and it was he who signed Tennessee's ratification of the 19th Amendment to the United States Constitution which extended suffrage to women. Tennessee's ratification gave the amendment the needed three-fourths majority required for passage. It was also during Robert's administration that women in Tennessee were allowed to own property. Miss Will Harris was secretary to Roberts in his Livingston office preceding his Governorship. She left his employment for that of Cordell Hull and accompanied him to Washington where he was later Secretary of State to President Roosevelt. Miss Harris remained his private secretary through these years.
