The Riverside Hotel is located overlooking the Rum River in the small rural town of St. Francis, fifteen miles north of the city of Anoka.

The hotel is a two story wood frame structure with clapboard siding. It is rectangular shaped with a projecting gable ended section of the front facade. The hotel was originally constructed. ca. 1860, in an "L" shape -- composed of two twostory gable ended sections. A two story gabled wing, with two dormers on the north and south facades, was added to the hotel's west facade at the turn of the century. A colonnaded porch, with a centrally located peak, was added to the projecting bay at that time. Original architectural design features are limited to the semi-circular windows in the east gable end and in the front projecting gable.

The front facade has recently been remodeled. Brick facing has been placed across the first two feet of the building's front facade. A full front porch with a sloping roof has also been added.

The interior of the hotel has undergone numerous remodelings since construction. It presently contains a bar and restaurant on the first floor and a residence on the second floor.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Riverside Hotel, constructed ca. 1860, is the only extant commercial building directly associated with St. Francis' settlement and subsequent boom period as a lumbering town. Its association with Anoka and St. Francis' founding family, the Woodbury family, is of added significance.

The hotel was originally built as a residence for the Woodbury family, who platted the towns of Anoka and St. Francis, and constructed dams and sawmills at both locations. The residence was expanded into a hotel to house lumbermen and seasonal workers who were employed in the Woodbury mills. The hotel's use peaked at the turn of the century with the demand for seasonal industrial worker's houseing. At the turn of the century St. Francis' industries included the Shaddick Creamery (1866), the St. Francis Mill (1888), the St. Francis Starch Factory (1895), and the St. Francis Canning Factory (1900).
