DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Open fields with wooded borders provide the setting for the Ezekiel Kelsey House. Since the middle of the 18th century this property has been farmland and has had nearly the same dimensions, running back from Beckley Road to the ridge east of the house. Clustered in the middle of this tract are the house and in the rear, a small barn and shed. Around the house are planted a variety of shrubs, and further away are shade trees and a stone wall.

The house itself dates from the middle of the 18th century and is of the "saltbox" form, $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories high, one room deep with a lean-to across the rear. Its modern-shingled roof has a continuous pitch. This was accomplished through the addition of an extra rear plate. There is an overhang of 4 - 6 inches above both the first and second stories on all three sides. The clapboards stop against beaded corner boards and extend almost to the ground, concealing the fieldstone foundation. Underneath are soft bricks filling in the spaces between studs. The central stack, brick above the first story, emerges with most of its depth behind the ridge. The main facade is of the five-window type. Its small windows are widely spaced and located close to the overhangs. The 12/8 sash was copied from remnants. The front doorway has a batten door, no transom and like the windows is surrounded by plain frames. The cornice and overhangs, however, are finished with simple moldings. There is an entrance with a paneled door on the south side, and in the rear, a door and a single window.

The interior has a great deal of original material, especially the north front room. The fireplace wall is completely covered with a simple arrangement of rectangular panels. Surrounding the opening are a series of raised moldings and at the top left there is a small open cupboard. The panelling is continued beneath the chair rail. The summer beam and other structural members are encased; a molded cornice runs the perimeter of the room and continues along the summer. In the northwest corner is a cupboard, with a round-arched opening above and a single door beneath. It has three of the usual curved shelves. Surrounding the whole is a raised molding; breaks in this and the room cornice form a key block ornament at the top of the arch.

The other front room has similar woodwork, including the cased beams and panelling. The brick fireplace is smaller and has a molded mantelshelf, probably later work. The kitchen has a large fireplace above which are three cupboards, the middle one very long. This wall is made up of featheredged vertical boards, whereas the walls of the adjacent south back room have horizontal boards. Upstairs the innermost walls of the chambers are of wide vertical boards. These rooms are very plain, with unfinished beams and posts. Only the north upper room has a fireplace, small and without any elaboration. Whereas the lower rooms have doors with four raised panels, the upper rooms have batten doors.

The original fabric of the house has been complemented by careful restoration. These include replaced summer moldings in the south front room, vertical wainscot like the kitchen's applied to one wall of the south rear room, replacement of some boards in the north upper room's wainscotting, and most of the hardware, old but not from this house. The front stairs have been turned around. Future plans include exposing the old oak floor beneath the modern one in the north front room. These restorations, 'ogether with the well-kept plaster and appropriate furnishings, enhance the historical character of the house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Ezekiel Kelsey House is a significant architectural resource because it is an excellent example of the saltbox form. The double overhang, the fivewindow facade, the small size of the windows, and the sweeping roofline give the house a plain and simple appearance. At the same time, the moldings under the overhangs and the beaded corner boards distinguish this simplicity from crudeness. The stone wall, open fields and informal landscaping contribute to the effect, as does the interior woodwork. The panelling and beam casings are crisply executed, with no pretension, classical allusion or over-elaboration, but careful workmanship all the same. Many of the house's features are in themselves significant historical remains, such as the brick in the walls or the corner cupboard, a cousin to contemporary fluted and shell-carved cupboards. The value of this material is increased by the context provided by this house, however, since it typifies the simple dignity of early Connecticut architecture.

Although the house has a very early appearance, its form and fenestration were quite common in Berlin throughout the 18th century, with examples dating from 1780 as well as 1720.1 This house, built around 1760, may be seen as a representative of a local building tradition which does not fit with evolutionary theories of the development of houseforms.

The house was built by Ezekiel Kelsey (1713-1795) either for himself or for his son Asahel, to whom he gave the dwelling in 1768. The elder Kelsey was granted this lot in 1753 by a division of Wethersfield common land. In addition to his activities as a farmer, Ezekiel owned a share in a saw mill and also knew the trades of the cooper and the carpenter-joiner.²

¹The W.P.A. census of historic buildings, done in the 1930's, did not list this house but did list four very similar structures nearby. Most had undergone much alteration. Manuscript in State Library, Hartford.

² The house has never been researched before, as far as can be determined, but the information reported herein can be derived with substantial certainty from the legal records cited.
