Three Confederate redoubts along the south bank of the Yalobusha River, near the Grenada Reservoir, are tangible evidences of the defenses constructed by the Confederates for the protection of the river crossings and the Mississippi Central and Mississippi-Tennessee Railroads at Grenada. During the Civil War these fortifications were approximately four miles north of the city.

Grenada, located in the center of the northern half of the state, had escaped the ravages of war until late summer of 1863, when Major General Ulysses S. Grant's victory at Vicksburg allowed him to turn his attention to the conquest of the interior of the state. Grant ordered Colonel John K. Mizner, cavalry commander at La Grange, Tennessee, to send "not less than 1,000 men and 50 train engineers" south along the Mississippi Central Railroad toward Grenada for the purpose of capturing all railroad equipment and rolling stock encountered. In the event the rolling stock could not be successfully removed to Memphis along the Mississippi-Tennessee line, it was to be destroyed, especially the axles and wheels. The Federal forces left for Grenada on August 10, 1863.

At the same time, the Federal cavalry under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Jesse J. Phillips was moving south from La Grange, Colonel Edward F. Winglow was leaving his headquarters along the Big Black River near Vicksburg on August 12 to proceed north along the Mississippi Central, to capture the railroad stock south of Grenada and to link up with Phillips' cavalry at Grenada.

Brigadier General James R. Chalmers, commander of the Confederates in the area, ordered the railroad stock brought into Grenada from the nearby towns, and the railroad bridges across the Yalobusha to be burned. Chalmers' scouts reported the pincer movement of the Federal cavalry from the north and the With the threat of being surrounded and captured, the south. earthworks along the Yalobusha would be untenable against attacks from two directions.

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Confederate opposition delayed the advance of both Phillips' and Winslow's cavalry in their march on Grenada. Phillips arrived in the area on the 15th of August while Winslow did not arrive until late on the 17th. Colonel Phillips reported that, when he came within about four miles north of Grenada, he saw a dense smoke that he afterward found to be the two railroad bridges across the Yalobusha that had been burned by the Confederates. Phillips also noted that the enemy was situated on the south side of the river in field positions with three pieces of artillery (two howitzers and one rifled gun). Phillips sent Lieutenant Colonel Martin R. M. Wallace about two miles down river to the lower ferry (where the Grenada Dam is today) to prevent the shifting of troops to the lower ferry. Wallace subsequently effected a crossing below the fortifications.

In order to avoid the capture of his troops, Colonel William F. Slemons, Confederate cavalry commander at Grenada, ordered their withdrawal, taking with them a wagon train of nearly one-hundred wagons. Colonel Phillips, not aware of the disposition of the troops moving north with Colonel Winslow and fearful of an attack from Brigadier General William H. Jackson's Confederate cavalry, known to be in the area, ordered the destruction of the railroad equipment. Fifty-one engines and nearly five-hundred cars along with a large quantity of ordnance and commissary were burned. For this action, Phillips was criticized by Winslow.

Although the earthworks were not used to their fullest potential because of the Federal pincer movement, they graphically represent the futile efforts of the Confederates to defend the crossings of the Yalobusha River.
