Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Thomas Walker Huey House (1847-48) is located in the Catawba region of rural Lancaster County near the North Carolina/South Carolina state line. The house is a simple, two-story, clapboard-sided, lateral-gabled residence with a full-facade one-story porch. The house is a good example of plain-style Greek Revival architecture in the upcountry.

Additional Information

The Huey plantation house is a two-story, lateral-gable, clapboard-sided residence with an infilled brick pier foundation with two brick exterior-end chimneys. The front has a full-facade, shed roof porch with simple upwardly-tapered columns with a slat balustrade and flushboard underneath. The pitch of roof in the back is extended similar to a saltbox to accommodate a double-pile configuration. The east facade has five bays with the central bay being the entry on first floor and a tripartite window on the second floor. The central entrance on the east facade is composed of double doors with sidelights and transom-lights. Nine-overnine-light double-hung sash is the typical window. In 1947 a 20' square kitchen and breezeway attached to a recessed porch center bay of the west facade of the house were destroyed and the porch enclosed.

The main floor layout of the house was originally a central-hall plan with two large rooms flanking the hall and two smaller rooms flanking the open recessed area but interconnected with the preceding larger room. The second floor plan was similar except the area above the recessed porch was enclosed. In 1947 the wall between the parlor and stairhall was removed to create one large space. The original wainscotting exists in the front rooms. This was once grained but is presently covered with white paint except for the inside of a small door to a storage area under the second story stair to the attic where it is still evident. The inscription "July 14, 1847" is painted in yellow on the underside of these stairs. The two front second story bedrooms have decorative, wood, cornice molding. The original tripartite Greek Revival mantels, some with decorative gougework, are intact around the four chimney openings.

The Thomas Walker Huey House is significant both as an intact example of plain-style Greek Revival architecture in the rural South Carolina upcountry, and for its association with Huey (1798-1854), a prominent nineteenth-century merchant, planter, and politician of Lancaster District.

The house was built by Huey in 1847-48. Huey, born in 1798, began managing his father's plantation on Cane Creek, near the North Carolina-South Carolina state line about 1820, inheriting it at his father's death in 1836. He operated a general store, sawmill, flour mill, and grist mill, and produced cotton on some 2500 acres with slave labor. Huey served Lancaster District at various times as a tax collector, presidential elector, and militia colonel, and as a commissioner for several railroads. He was elected to the South Carolina Senate from Lancaster District three times, and was in his third term at his death in 1854. The <u>Lancaster Ledger</u> observed in an obituary that "Col. Huey has filled various offices of honor and trust in this district . . . though not a brilliant man, possessed a strong mind, and exercised profound judgment; he was therefore highly respected in that body of legislators. . . . He owned a large body of land in this district, and possessed at the time of his demise, various interest in property in the states of Alabama and Mississippi."(1)
