## **Narrative Description**

5. Classification

Building #145 is located at the north end of the wooded Two Medicine Campground, approximately 1/4 mile east of the Two Medicine General Store (formerly the Two Medicine Chalet dining room) and 200' north of Two Medicine Lake. This is a single-story log dwelling with a square footprint. The building is constructed on a stone-pier foundation and is topped with a front-gable log-frame roof. Roof features include a dimensional-lumber soffit, exposed rafters and purlins, and a wide eave overhang. The front gable extends approximately two feet beyond the side walls to protect the entry. Log columns and an exposed log-truss system support this extension. The logs are joined with saddle notches and are chinked with painted cement. Log ends are square cut and are protected by the eave overhang. This treatment (contrasting with the unprotected chopper-cut ends found on many park rustic log buildings) may represent a modification.

Front (south) elevation features are limited to a vertical-plank/four-light door, paired with a wood-frame screen door and flanked to the west by a six-light awning window. A six-light awning window is centered within the west elevation. The rear (north) elevation contains a paneled door. This door is set above the sill log, incorporates a four-light window, and appears to be a modification, possible installed to provide more direct access to the outhouse located immediately behind the building. There are no features on the east elevation. All window and door surrounds are four-inch painted milled lumber. The building is painted brown and is in generally good condition, with some deterioration of the log ends. Obvious modifications are limited to reconstruction of the rear-elevation window.

The one-room interior is finished with painted six-inch pine floors. The log walls are chinked with poles and the ceiling is open, exposing the log truss system. The four-inch milled-lumber door and window surrounds are painted white. Fixed furnishings include a modern sink/cupboard unit, an historic wall-mounted cupboard and a Schrader wood stove. Modern additions include an electric range, wire conduits, and bare-bulb light fixtures, all dating to the 1992 introduction of electricity. Structural modifications appear to be limited to the replacement of a log in the northwest corner and possible replacement of the north wall window with a door.

## Narrative Statement of Significance

This small cabin is significant at the local level for its associated with a significant trend in park visitation patterns: the increase of middle-class automobile tourists and NPS development of infrastructure appropriate to this new clientele. The building is also associated with federal administration of the Two Medicine backcountry and with rustic architecture. It is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places with significance in history and architecture (criteria A and C; NR areas of significance: Government, Recreation, Architecture) and is a component of the Minor Developed Areas property type, as defined in the Glacier National Park Multiple Property Listing.

The Two Medicine "Ranger Cabin," located at the north end of the Two Medicine Campground, near the head of the Two Medicine trail network, was constructed ca. 1927 as accommodations for the seasonal ranger assigned patrol of the Two Medicine country and custodianship of the adjacent NPS campground. It continues to provide housing for the campground caretaker.

This building represented the limits to the NPS administrative presence in the area during the historic period. The park's 1933 *Master Plan* reported that "no warehouse or shops are necessary owing to the nearness to main source of supply at Glacier Park Station." Also in 1933, the NPS Branch of Plans and Design suggested construction of a large auto camp composed of tepee-shaped cabins identical to those proposed for Roes Creek (Rising Sun); ancillary buildings were to include a community building, a store/cafeteria, and a new and enlarged Ranger Cabin. The auto camp was never constructed. The campground was significantly enlarged and a "multiple ranger and caretaker cabin" constructed west of the historic ranger cabin in 1965.
