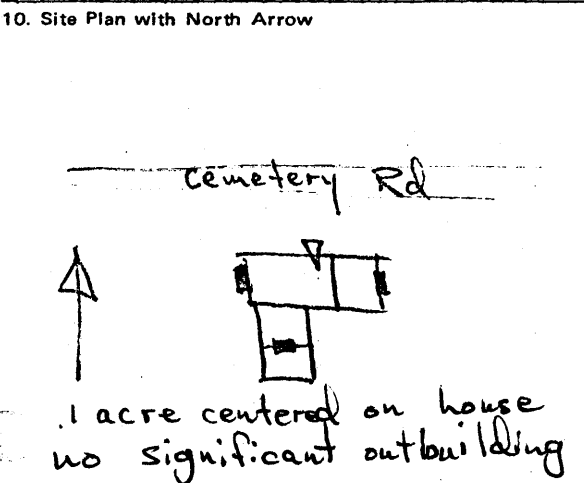

Description 2 story brick - unbanded front - common bond sides - built in 2 sections - right 3 bay built 1st - originally side passage plan - left 2 bays built later - Greek Revival mantels in right parlor and 1st room in ell - original stair in porch or angle of ell - now enclosed square open well plan - triple pilladian window later molding - stone lintels and sills - compatible additions and alterations - later portico (alterations turn-of-century)

19. History James Ewing born in 1818 married Virginia Boxley in 1839 - He built this house in 1858

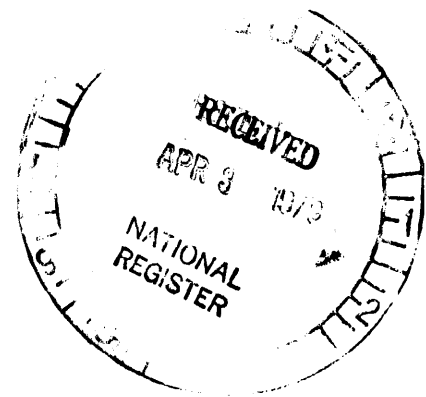

Architecture:

77. One of the best known houses in Warren County, this structure was transformed from a side passage plan, two-storied Greek Revival house into a grandiose neoclassical I-house at the turn of the century by the addition of a two-storied, two-bayed block at one end for the sake of symmetry, a monumental, balustraded portico, a palladian window with balcony in the center of the upper floor, and a porte-cochere. The additions and alterations did not obscure the evidence or details of the original block.
