This one-room log cabin is apparently as sturdy as it was when first built in 1885, and is little altered in appearance. It was originally chinked with wood and mud, but in later years cement replaced the mud. The gable ends are of vertical board, and the roof is of tin with a board sub-roof. The original roof was reportedly made of tim. The cabin is of log lock-joint construction.

The cabin originally had a wood floor. The present wood floor was placed over it in the 1920s.

There is one door at one end of the cabin and one window on one side.

Although perhaps it is more sturdy than many old cabins, it is little different than most honestead cabins and of little architectural significance. It is important for its longtime and most important occupant, Enos Mills.

Today the cabin is a museum and houses many of the papers, books, furniture and other memorabilia associated with Mills, and is maintained by his daughter, Mrs. Enda Mills Kiley, and her husband.

Enos Mills, although a self-taught man, was no doubt Colorado's greatest naturalist. He wrote fifteen books and countless articles on nature. In his day his works were known around the world and many of them are still referred to today. He made climbing Longs Peak a national pastime. He was one of the earlier and most eloquent spokesmen for setting aside open space and our scenic lands for public use by all. Among his other accomplishments he has been called the "father of the field trip" and the "father of Rocky Mountain National Park."

Mills built his homestead cabin in 1885, while only 15 years old. Here he studied nature, from books and first hand. He also did most of his early writing in this cabin. He learned much about Longs Peak from the Reverend E. J. Lamb, who homesteaded a short distance away. The Reverend Lamb and his son were longtime guides up Longs Peak. Mills himself broke many new trails up the difficult mountain and began leading trips up it at an early age. During some thirty years it is estimated that he led more than 250 trips up the mountain. But they were more than just "trips," they were "nature tours." In his later years, Mills trained nature guides.

He was also successful in having "his mountain" and the surrounding Rocky Mountain National Park set aside as a National Park.

Mills purchased the Lamb homestead in 1902 and turned it into a lodge, lecture center and souvenir shop. It burned down a short time later and was rebuilt, although altered from the original.

However, Mills' Homestead Cabin is virtually the same as it was when Mills built it. Mills died here in 1922, but it is still owned and maintained by his daughter and her husband. She would like to preserve it as a museum, study center or some such use as a memorial to her father. Many of her father's books, papers and other memoration remain in the cabin.
