DESCRIPTION

SUMMARY

The Old First National Bank Building, located at 133 West Marion Avenue in Punta Gorda, Florida, is a masonry, two story Neo-Classical style building. Built circa 1912, it contributes to the Punta Gorda Multiple Property Group under Associated Property Type, Buildings of Punta Gorda, 1884-1930, and is an example of the subtype, Commercial Architecture. A non-contributing one story, stucco garage was built on the back lot of the property in 1985.

SETTING

The Old First National Bank Building is located in the middle of a block of abutting commercial buildings that were built during the Florida Land Boom. (Photo 16.) The commercial block sits directly across Marion Avenue from the former site of the Punta Gorda Hotel, which was built in 1887 to accommodate wealthy northern tourists. The hotel burned in 1959.

The area around the Old First National Bank remains a commercial district, though most of the historic commercial buildings have been drastically altered in the last 10 years. Across Marion Avenue, a shopping center now occupies the former site of the Punta Gorda Hotel.

DESCRIPTIVE STATEMENT

The Old First National Bank Building is a two story, masonry Neo-Classical style building located at 133 West Marion Avenue in downtown Punta Gorda, Florida. Constructed around 1912, the building is rectangular in plan and has a flat, built up roof. The facade has a straight parapet roofline with a central pediment and the front entrance is flanked by large columns 16 feet in height. The side elevations abut adjacent commercial buildings. (Photos 1 - 2.)

The walls of the building are 12 inches thick and the ceilings are 16 feet high. On the interior, the original marble teller counters, marble floors, bank vault and brick fireplace remain intact. (Photos 3 - 11.)

ALTERATIONS

In the 1980s, the wood sash windows in the facade were replaced with aluminum frame windows. (Photos 1 - 2.) A one story, open porch (lanai) was attached to the back of the building and a wrought iron fence was placed at the south end (back entrance) of the property. (Photos 13 - 15.) The front part of the interior, where the old marble teller cages are located, remains intact and is now used as an office area by the owner. (Photos 3 - 4.) The rest of the building has been adapted for use as the owner's residence, but retains the original scale, materials, workmanship, and setting of the historic bank building. (Photos 8 - 12.)

NON-CONTRIBUTING RESOURCES

During the 1980s, a one story, stucco garage was constructed on the back lot of the property. (Photo 15.)

SIGNIFICANCE

SUMMARY

The Old First National Bank Building, at 133 West Marion Avenue, is significant at the local level under Criterion A for its association with the development of the early 20th century business community of Punta Gorda. Built circa 1912, it contributes to the Punta Gorda Multiple Property Group under Associated Historic Context: Exploration, Settlement and Early Development of Punta Gorda, 1884-1930, and Associated Property Type: Buildings of Punta Gorda, 1884-1930. The two story Neo-Classical building is a good example of the subtype, Commercial Architecture.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

The Old First National Bank Building, at 133 West Marion Avenue, is located in the downtown commercial area of Punta Gorda, Florida. Constructed circa 1912, it is a two story, masonry Neo-Classical commercial building. The bank was state chartered in 1912 under the name of Merchants Bank of Punta Gorda. It was the second bank to open in Punta Gorda, preceded only by the Punta Gorda Bank. In 1914, it switched to a federal charter and became the First National Bank of Punta Gorda. By 1927, it was the most prosperous of the three banks located in the city.

The collapse of the Florida Land Boom in 1926 deflated land values and set off a state-wide financial crisis. In 1929, all three banks located in Punta Gorda failed. Throughout the state that year, a total of 9 federally chartered banks and 43 state chartered banks closed. The Old First National Bank of Punta Gorda did not reopen.

The bank building is significant for its role in the development of commercial business in Punta Gorda. During the 1920s, Punta Gorda, like other areas of Florida, underwent a period of rapid growth. Tourism, fishing, and agriculture were major sources of income for the local population. The Old First National Bank was a leader in meeting the financial needs of the local business community.

Today, the Old First National Bank Building is the oldest extant bank building in Charlotte County. In addition, it is one of the few commercial buildings in Punta Gorda which retains its historic integrity.
