DESCRIPTION

The Treadwell Street Historic District contains approximately forty buildings, all but one of which (#21) were originally residences. The majority of the buildings were constructed between ca. 1890 and ca. 1930 and are set on small lots planted with bushes, trees, and lawns. Most of the houses are onestory, weatherboarded frame, with simple design and detailing.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANCE

Treadwell Street Historic District contains the intact sections of an earlytwentieth century black neighborhood. The district provides significant information about the history of the black community in Orangeburg in the early twentieth century. According to local residents, this neighborhood was one of the most well-to-do black neighborhoods in the city.(1) All residents of Treadwell Street, as well as those of the Treadwell-Amelia Streets intersection, listed in the 1920-1921 Orangeburg City Directory, were black. Most of those listed were laborers or tradesmen, but there were also a few professionals and businessmen living in the neighborhood. For example, Dr. Henry Rowe, a physician and druggist lived in what is now 333 Treadwell Street (#3); the Reverend Nelson C. Nix, who served as pastor of Mt. Pisgah Baptist Church and was also dean and instructor in the department of mathematics at South Carolina State College, lived at the corner of Treadwell and Amelia Streets (#26).(2) Professor J. A. Pierce, an instructor at South Carolina State, lived at 358 Treadwell (#44). According to Dr. Pierce's daughter, Mrs. Geraldyne Zimmerman, Mrs. Pierce operated a school for black children in the house because of the poor reputation of public schools for blacks in the city.(3)

ACREAGE: Approximately 11 acres

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION: The boundary of the Treadwell Street Historic District is shown as the bold black line on the accompanying Treadwell Street Historic District map. The map was copied from Orangeburg County Tax Map #22, drawn at a scale of one inch equals 200 feet. The district includes the historic sections of the Treadwell Street neighborhood which are still intact while excluding as many noncontributing resources as possible.

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

Key resources which define the character of the district:

4. 325 Treadwell Street: One-story, hip-roofed, frame house sheathed in weatherboard, constructed ca. 1915. Hipped roof porch on facade fronts a broad, pedimented ell and shelters a recessed single-door entrance with six lights, two-light sidelights, and a six-light transom, flanked on each side by six-over-six,double-hung sash windows with plain wooden surrounds.

6. 149 Treadwell: Two-story, weatherboarded frame residence with gabled roof, constructed ca. 1895. One-story, shed-roofed porch with decorative brackets and turned balustrade shelters a three-bay facade. A single-door entrance with a two-light transom and three-light sidelights resting on wooden panels, is flanked by single, six-over-six, double-hung sash windows. Second-story facade windows are also six-over-six, double-hung sash.

26. Nelson C. Nix House (710 Amelia Street): Probably constructed ca. 1890, this is a large, two-story, frame, L-shaped residence with a gabled roof. A single door entrance with multi-paned transom and sidelights over wooden panels is flanked by double, six-over-six windows with plain surrounds. There are additions on the right and left. The house is sheathed in asbestos shingle siding.
