7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The McKenzie Log Cabin, built by David McKenzie, is a rectangular $1\frac{1}{2}$ story structure measuring 34' 6" by 30' 4", consisting of two pens. It is not known if the dwelling was originally a double pen structure as it is today or whether the eastern pen, constructed of poplar, was built first followed by the addition of the western pen which is of yellow pine.

The eastern and presumably older pen, probably built shortly after purchase of the property in 1860, measures 16' $8\frac{1}{2}$ " X 16' $3\frac{1}{2}$ " and is constructed of half timbers ranging from 1' 1" to 1' 6" in thickness. Depth of notch ranges from 6" to 8". There are eight logs in the eastern elevation of this pen with none in the south elevation. Ground to roof apex height is ca. 14'6". The northeast and southeast corners rest on sandstone slab piers that rise ca. 1' 9" above ground. The east side has one window and the south side has a centrally located fireplace with a crudely finished sandstone chimney.

The western pen, built of hand hewn yellow pine, measures 14' 4" X 16' 4". There are ten logs in the northern and southern elevations with nine logs in the eastern and western elevation. Half dovetail notching is the predominant corner notching, but both inverted V and square notching are also used. The logs range from 10" to 1' in height and are ca. 6" in thickness. The east side has a fireplace and chimney sitting directly against the opposing fireplace and chimney. The south side has a centrally located door with a window to the east of the door. The west side has one window. A set of steps leads from the front porch along the east side of the first unit. The second unit was built during the Civil War. (McKenzie: 1976, 1980).

At the end of this building period the cabin had the classic configuration of a $1\frac{1}{2}$ story saddlebag house which is still found in West Virginia and Kentucky. Both units are chinked with fine yellow clay with small pebble inclusions. The structure was covered with shake roof in this period.

Sometime after the Civil War, a final addition was put on the north side of the cabin. This addition was built with sawmill lumber and measures 29' 5" long and 8' deep with a 5' 8" by 8' porch on the northwest corner of the structure. The tops of the chimneys have been removed and the entire structure, including the front porch, was covered with a tin roof. Shake shingles still are visible underneath the tin roof on the north half of the structure.

post Civil War Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

David McKenzie came to Johnson County, Kentucky in the early 1840's; his name appears in a list of Johnson County residents from 1844-1848 (Hall: 1923, 88). The lower Peter Cave Branch land upon which the McKenzie Cabin stands was not acquired by David McKenzie until 1860.

The house has been the residence of six generations of McKenzies: David; David's son, Lafayette; Lafayette's son, William H.; William H.'s son, Forest; Forest's son, Everett; and Everett's daughter, Ann.

The Paintsville Lake Environmental Assessment rated the McKenzie cabin at a Regional Level of Significance. Log Cabins are common in eastern Kentucky; however, few are as well preserved as the McKenzie cabin and few exhibit the quality of workmanship found in this cabin. The fitting of the half timbers and half dovetail notching is of superior quality. The cabin, typical of log architecture on the region is significant because of its excellent craftsmanship and fine state of preservation. The log cabin is reportly the best example of log architecture in Johnson County.

No log cabins have been nominated to the National Register in the Johnson and Morgan County Region and the number of well preserved cabins is rapidly diminishing.
