Summary Paragraph

The Administration Building, located at 831 Southeast 172 Road, is a one-story building, situated at the peak of a rise after entering the colony. Constructed in 1935, the building is the work of the Works Progress Administration. Although the Veteran's Colony encompasses over 700 acres, just the site of the Administration Building is covered by this nomination. Common elements identified on the building include the random course stone exterior siding and wood frame nine-over-nine double hung windows.

Narrative Description

The side gabled façade, north elevation, has a central entry covered by a gable front porch. Three slab steps with stepped stone knee walls, lead to the panel wood door. West of the entry are two sets of two nine-overnine double hung windows and a smaller nine-over-nine double hung window. East of the entry is a nine-over-nine double hung window. Each window has a rusticated stone sill and a smooth stone lintel. Located at the northeast corner is a single bay gable front wing. Each elevation of this wing has a single nine-over-nine double hung window. Each window has a rusticated stone sill and a smooth stone lintel.

The east elevation has a metal panel door at the northeast corner. Historically, this was a wood panel door. There are no other openings on this elevation. The south elevation has a single bay gable front wing at the southeast corner. Each elevation of this wing has a single nine-over-nine double hung window. Each window has a rusticated stone sill and a smooth stone lintel. Located in the center of the south elevation are two aluminum frame glass doors. Above the door is a wood frame fan-light. On either side of the door are two nine-over-nine double hung windows. The four windows and doors are sheltered by a shed roof supported by three stone piers. Two stone steps with stone knee walls lead to the porch. Located in the center of the porch roof is a gablet. Located west of the porch are two nine-over-nine double hung windows and one smaller nine-over-nine double hung windows. All of the windows have a rusticated stone sill and a smooth stone lintel.

The west elevation has a central chimney. On either side of the chimney are two nine-over-nine double hung windows. All of the windows have a rusticated stone sill and a smooth stone lintel. Located at the northwest corner is a metal trap door for cleaning the chimney. Two additional stone chimneys punctuate the roof on the north elevation.

Interior:

The interior has a large open space with a chimney and built-in platform at the west end of the room. The east end of the building has office space, a kitchen and bathroom facilities.

Alterations include the installation of a metal roof and the replacement of the doors on the east and south elevations.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance and applicable criteria.)

The Administration Building is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A for its association with the work undertaken by the Works Progress Administration and Criterion C for its architectural significance as an excellent example of Works Progress Administration construction. The work relief provided by the WPA allowed many local people to survive the trying times of the 1930's while also stimulating the local, and therefore state and national, economies. The building is located in the Veterans Colony near Wilburton, Oklahoma and was built in 1935.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least one paragraph for each area of significance.)

Oklahoma in general was especially hard hit by the depression of the early 1930s. Within the State, the southeast counties suffered most. By 1930, 62% of all farms in Oklahoma were tenant operated, but in the southeast it was 10 to 15 percent higher than the rest of the state. Three successive droughts early in the 1930s only added to the misery already produced by tenancy and tilling of half fertile soil.

Other sectors of the economy in the southeast fared just as poorly. Between 1930 and 1935 coal production decreased by two-thirds. Mines closed and one-half of the total labor force was left unemployed. The absence of a market for timber products virtually closed the forest industry in the southeast as well. By October of 1934, 21% of all Oklahoma families on relief rolls were in southeastern Oklahoma."

Economic and the morale of the southeastern region of Oklahoma were in dire circumstances in 1935. Fortunately, the WPA provided timely assistance. The construction component of the WPA greatly assisted those in need in southeastern Oklahoma. It provided meaningful employment and some degree of financial security. The Administration Building is significant for its association with the WPA program.

The physical, economic and cultural environment of the Veterans Colony shaped the built environment. As the Administration Building was part of the Works Progress Administration (WPA) building program it had to be: useful in terms of the needs of the community, sponsored by a public body and project workmen had to come from persons on the relief rolls.

Both skilled and unskilled relief workers were used for the construction of the Administration Building. Because of the nature of the workers, the building was simple in design and uncomplicated in construction technique. At any one time sponsors of projects had to supply from ten to twenty-five percent of the total construction cost which meant that the building was generally modest. The construction cost contributed by the Veterans Colony consisted of materials: stone quarried locally, wood and roofing materials. The Administration Building is vernacular in style but distinctly identifiable as WPA architecture.

The method of construction, contribution of materials, and sources of labor were standard operating procedures for the WPA throughout the nation. WPA buildings are significant as the program through which they were funded significantly reduced the economic and social distress of the national depression of the 1930s. The Administration Building provides a legacy to the WPA through recognizable architecture by its type, style, scale, materials and workmanship. The Administration Building is significant as an excellent local example of WPA construction in Latimer County.

Developmental history/additional historic context information (if appropriate)

During the Spanish-American War, which lasted from April into August 1898, men from Oklahoma and Indian territories enlisted for service. Others serving in the regular United States Army or Navy also fought. At the war's end most of the soldiers returned to their homes and resumed their lives.

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Throughout the United States, veterans of the Spanish-American conflict, the Philippines Insurrection (1899–1902), and the Chinese Relief Expedition (Boxer Rebellion, 1898–1902) began to organize veterans' fraternal societies. The first of these to appear in Oklahoma formed in Guthrie as early as 1901 and was affiliated with a national group called Spanish-American War Veterans. In 1904 the various national organizations joined together as the United Spanish War Veterans (USWV). Each state had a "department" led by a commander and other officers. Local chapters were called "camps." Most states' camps held annual reunions and also sent delegates to a large national convention. In the Department of Oklahoma, by 1942 the USWV had thousands of members in thirty-one camps (the national USWV disbanded in 1992). "

In 1933 Oklahoma members of the USWV began to plan a "colony" for other veterans who needed assistance. C. C. Hawk, a businessman from Shawnee, state chair of the Republican Party, and past commander of the Department of Oklahoma, joined other affluent veterans to arrange for the purchase of over 700 acres of land south of Wilburton. A camp of USWV was established and an administrative board elected. By September 1935, the administration building stood on the property, and veterans had built and occupied fifteen cabins. The property included a dozen or so other buildings, a campground for nonpermanent residents, a large orchard, and two wells. The state's WPA and CCC participated in developing those and other facilities that would benefit veterans for generations.

Eligibility was generally limited to Oklahoma's veterans. Each paid ten dollars for a "lifetime lease" to an acre of ground and constructed his own dwelling. Employed veterans in other parts of the state could build a "vacation" cabin there and pay an assessment, which was used for the colony's general operating support. Timber, rock, gravel and sand were furnished without charge. In future decades, admission to Veterans' Colony broadened to include veterans who belonged to the Veterans of Foreign Wars or the American Legion; a lifetime lease cost two hundred dollars; and veterans were still required to build their own residences.
