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

44. Site Plan (and boundary description and justification for N.R. sites):

Beginning at point A, proceeding 120 feet south along a line 20 feet east of the house to point B, thence west 130 feet along a line 20 feet south of the house to point C, thence north 120 feet along the east side of a drive to point D, thence 130 feet east along the south side of old U.S.60 to the point of origin. The boundaries were drawn to include the house and its domestic-related space. No outbuildings are included.

Point A is located at the intersection of a line drawn 20 feet east of and parallel to the eastern side of the house's east wing with the southern edge of old U.S. 60.

45. Description and House Plan:

A one-1/2 story brick double-pile center-passage dwelling of three bays with recessed single-pile wings. Interior incorporates chimneys on interior along center passage wall (one to each room). Recessed entry bay with cast iron columns and brackets, patterned glass in sidelights, jack-arched paired or double windows, bracketted cornice, double-stretcher bond brickwork. Largescale Greek Revival-inspired trim inside. Similar in date and form to the William Blackwell House (WSS-28) in neighboring Springfield, Washington County.
