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Summary

The Mountain View School is a single story, stone masonry classroom building designed in a restrained version of the Craftsman style. Its rectangular plan is highlighted only by the central front porch on the main or northern elevation, which itself features a gable roof supported upon two Craftsman wood columns supported by stone piers. The entrances behind are set into a recessed porch wall. The hipped roof is covered with asphalt shingles, the walls faced with stone, and the structure rests upon a continuous stone foundation.

Elaboration

The Mountain View School is a single story, stone masonry classroom building designed in a restrained version of the Craftsman style. Its rectangular plan is highlighted only by the central front porch on the main or northern elevation, which itself features a gable roof supported upon two Craftsman wood columns supported by stone piers. The entrances behind are set into a recessed porch wall. The hipped roof is covered with asphalt shingles, the walls faced with stone, and the structure rests upon a continuous stone foundation.

The northern or front elevation is symmetrically-organized around the projecting, pedimented entrance porch. The porch roof is supported upon two wooden, box columns that rest upon stone piers and a concrete deck. The recessed entrance bay behind is accessed via two single-leaf entrances with transoms. The walls to either side of the entrance porch are lighted with a small, six-pane rectangular window next to the porch and two taller, nine-over-nine wood sash windows toward the ends of the elevation. The southern elevation opposite features two original entrances—the single-leaf entrance toward the western elevation and the central, single-leaf entrance—though the original window bay toward the western end has been filled and cut down, and a new overhead rolling door opening has been cut into the wall near the eastern elevation to accommodate the fire engine housed within.

The eastern and western elevations are blank.

The Mountain View School has been substantially altered only on its southern or rear elevation, largely due to its adaptation as a fire station. Otherwise the building is largely original and unaltered.

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Mountain View School

Russellville, at the time the largest city between Little Rock and Fort Smith and a major depot point on the Missouri Pacific line, has long been an important economic and commercial center in western Arkansas. During the 1920's, the largest industries included a lumber mill, a woodworking plant, gins, coal mining, and a cotton compresses. The construction of the Mountain View School in 1926 illustrated not only the growth of the Russellville community and the concomitant need for expanded educational facilities, but also the effectiveness of Governor Thomas C. McRae's educational reforms passed during the General Assembly special session of March, 1924.

The Mountain View School, constructed during the period covered by the historic context *The Evolution of the Public School System in the Arkansas Ozarks*, 1920-1940, is a representative example of a small stone school building constructed for a rural school district. Its use during this period as a local school building clearly identifies it with this historic context and with this property type. It is significant locally under Criterion A through its direct associations with the history of the evolution of the public school system in the Ozark Mountain region of the state during this period.

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of a line running along the southern edge of State Highway 326 with a perpendicular line running parallel with the building's eastern elevation and located approximately 50 feet to the east thereof, proceed southerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to its intersection with a perpendicular line running parallel to the building's southern elevation; thence proceed westerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to its intersection with a line running parallel to the building's western elevation; thence proceed northerly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to its intersection with a perpendicular line running along the southern edge of State Highway 326; thence proceed easterly along said line for a distance of approximately 200 feet to the point of beginning.
