Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance SUMMARY

A large frame structure with traces of Queen Anne influence, the Greening House in Hope, Hempstead County has a deceptive outward appearance in that the interior is a highly stylized array of wainscoting, elaborate mantels and other pieces of impressive woodwork. The central-hall structure rests on a brick foundation and is crowned with a hipped roof with large gables on each end. The asymmetrical facade, with its porches and beveled and leaded glass, combined with an impressive display of untouched interior detailing, make the Greening House one of the finest structures of its period in Hope.

ELABORATION

The Greening House, constructed in 1903, is a two-story frame structure clad in native pine weatherboard. The structure rests on a continuous brick foundation and is topped with a hipped roof which is pierced on each side with gables and dormer windows.

The west (front) elevation is dominated by a full-height bay lined with one-over-one double-hung sash windows on each level and a large front porch. Positioned on the northwest portion of the facade is a projection from which the bay extends, all capped with a gable roof that is supported by brackets. A multi-paned semi-circular window is positioned in the center of the pediment.

The porch, supported by heavy brick columns, initiates at the bay and wraps around the structure to encompass most of the south elevation. The porch is covered with a gently sloping roof, excepting the area above the main entryway which is flat to allow for a sitting area. Dentils trim the cornice of the flat main porch entryway. A centered gabled dormer with two decorative multi-pane one-over-one, double-hung sash windows pierces the roof. Side-by-side diamond-pattern-over-one double-hung sash windows are placed on the second story between the entryway and the gabled dormer.

Additional rooms were added to the east elevation not long after the original construction date. On the first floor two rooms, a simple staircase, and a screened-in porch are covered by a shed roof on the south and a gable roof on the north. A sun porch centered on the second story is finished with a hipped roof.

The main entryway is surrounded by sidelights and a transom made of leaded and beveled glass, all of which are encased in decorative woodwork.


In plan the Greening House is a central-hall structure, excluding the additions to the back elevation. From the wide foyer the house reveals three rooms and a stairway. The parlor, located to the right, is separated from the foyer by a colonnade of four columns with Ionic capitals. Sheathed in wainscoting, the room contains one of three elaborately carved mantels.

A door topped with a glass transom leads to a living room which contains a fireplace with an ornate mantel composed of four columns with Ionic capitals, decorative swags, and a beveled glass mirror.

To the left of the foyer paneled pocket doors open to a living room with a fireplace, the mantle of which is decorated with columns with "Egyptian"-inspired capitals accented with a foliated design.

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The dining room, lined with wainscoting, is positioned behind the living room. A bedroom, two bathrooms, a kitchen and screened porch lie behind these rooms.

The main staircase, placed at the back of the foyer, is embellished with a diamond-pattern wood panel below the bannister and a newel post at the bottom. Paneling lines the staircase wall below and wainscoting covers the stairwell.

From the second landing the second flight of stairs winds to the left, creating interesting lines in the foyer below. The stair leads to the second floor's large central hall divided with an arch as the foyer is below.

From the central hall lie four large bedrooms, two on each side, and a bathroom.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

SUMMARY

Facing the Missouri-Pacific Railroad Line, the Greening House in Hope, Hempstead County, possesses a transitional exterior that exhibits traces of the Queen Anne style, while the interior is a splendid combination of wainscoting, mirrored and columned mantels, and pine floors. The Greening House was one of seven houses built by businessman E. S. Greening in conjunction with carpenter Tom Crosnoe and is by far the most elaborate of the group. Although the house was completed in 1903, the interior remains intact and in excellent condition, deeming the structure among the finest of its period in Hope.

ELABORATION

The Greening House is situated on a spacious lot and shaded by large trees in the town's most prestigous turn-of-the-century neighborhood. Like many communities in Arkansas, the town of Hope sprang up when the railroad transversed the area. Hempstead County was formed in 1818 with the town of Washington as the county seat. The first railroad charter was granted by the county to the Cairo-Fulton Railroad in 1853, although work did not begin until 1870. In 1874 the St. Louis, Iron Mountain and Southern Railroad took over the line and built the passenger depot. The business district of Hope rapidly grew around the depot and approximately six blocks east of the business district was Mr. Greening's choice for his two-story house. By 1939 the Hempstead County seat was moved from Washington to Hope due to its central location and its accessability to the railroad and the major portion of the area's businesses.

Mr. Greening was born and raised in Camden, Ouachita County and moved to Hope in 1892. Although the town's first businesses developed in the mid-1870's when the railroad laid tracks through the area, Mr. Greening came to Hope at a crucial period when the existing businesses were established and growing, facilitating the need for service-oriented institutions.

During Greening's first years in Hope he joined the ranks of other small businessmen when he opened a store. He later became a cotton buyer and a builder, the Greening House being one of seven houses constructed by Greening and carpenter Tom Crosnoe. After meeting with success in his small business ventures, Greening, now a respected community businessman, became a co-founder of the Hope Federal Savings and Loan Association. In 1927 he founded what is today Hope's oldest independent insurance agency. In 1947 Greening sold his interest in the agency to Fred Ellis, and it became the Greening-Ellis Insurance Agency.

Although Greening constructed seven houses, this first effort is by far the most splendid because of its exceptional interior. The modestly detailed exterior presents the image of a large, though undistinguished residence, but once inside the structure is an impressive display of untouched wainscoting which lines the parlor, foyer, dining room and stairwell and elaborate mantels comprise a well-preserved showplace.

E.S. Greening was a respected and successful businessman whose efforts contributed to the prosperity of Hope in the town's past and laid a foundation for the present. The Greening House is one of the town's grandest links with a prosperous past and one of the men who made it possible.



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
