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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Located on the northeast corner of Catherine Street and Monterey Place, this house is one of the finest examples of High Victorian Queen Anne residential architecture in the city of Mobile. This two-story frame building is inventive in plan with its cross axes, projecting wings and voids in the form of balconies, porches and porte-cocheres which have been incorporated into the overall massing of the house. A variety of wood decorations such as turned, incised, scrolled, basket woven lattice, spindles, reels and other patterns combine to create a fanciful ornamentation typical of the Queen Anne period.

The original interior fabric has to a large measure remained intact, though minor changes have occurred over the span of years. The changes have been basically contained in the small anteroom off the living room where one wall was removed, a built-in bookcase installed and one mantel changed out. All of the changes have been handled in a compatible manner.

Of the original fabric and integrity therein there are eleven coal burning fireplaces with cherry and/or oak mantels; pine floors throughout; quarter sawn oak (or tiger oak) treds on the stairs; three intricate jewel cut stained glass leaded windows, two in the stairwell and one in the living room; original brass hardware on doors and windows; and the original brass light fixtures with hand blown glass globes still remain. The kitchen cabinetry is also original to the house, made of pine with arched panels of glass in each door. In the foyer and in the dining room there are jig-saw cut and spindle work friezes spanning the bay windows. These friezes are similar to but smaller than the exterior Victorian woodwork.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Architecture:

Monterey Place stands today as one of the best examples of High Victorian Queen Anne residential architecture in the city of Mobile. Many such homes were constructed in Mobile around the turn of the century, but unfortunately a great number of these Queen Anne structures have been lost to commercial encroachment over the years. Its elaborate form and fanciful detailing are rivalled only by the Tacon-Gordon Tissington House at 1216 Government Street and the Pollock Houses at 505, 507, and 509 Church Street. Monterey Place is often enumerated as an outstanding building within the Old Dauphin Way Preservation Neighborhood, a very diverse and varied blend of architectural styles ranging from early Gulf Coast cottages to 20th century bungalows.

Education:

In the early 1900's Kate Shepard and her sister taught school on the second floor of the house. The school was known as the "Misses Shepard School" and the courses of study included primary and intermediate departments and general high school courses. Many Mobilians received their basic education under the guidance of the Shepard sisters.

Integrity:

Although there have been minor changes to the exterior of the house (the main change being the replacement of two wood columns with brick columns on the east side of the house to create a carport area) a great deal of the exterior fabric and in particular the original wood detailing along the porches and balconies remains. The interior also possesses much of its original fabric—in particular the room arrangement, fireplaces, floors, walls, ceilings, door and window framings, hardware and some lighting fixtures.

Miscellaneous:

Monterey Place was built in 1898 by Charles M. Shepard. It was known as the Shepard House until the street Monterey Place was cut through in 1910 at which time the house began to be referred to as the Monterey Place. The Shepard family remained in ownership until 1974 when the last family member, Kate M. Shepard, died.
