This courthouse is locally significant as the historical focus of county government, and of the political power and prestige derived from the community's status as the county seat. As center of county government, an Iowa town was reasonably assured of economic and population growth, and a prominent role in local social and political life. The county courthouse represents a significant public investment in a structure built not simply for utilitarian purposes, but also as a monument associated with the historical importance of county organization and development. This is the fourth courthouse in Iowa County.

The Board of County Commissioners of Iowa County gave the order for the erection of their first county courthouse on April 14, 1847. The order specified that a one-room building be constructed but no specifications for dimensions or cost were given. William Hench won the contract for construction of the courthouse and finished it the same year it was begun. The board of supervisors, however, decided that the building was not what they wanted after inspecting it. Rather than going to court over the courthouse, the builder gracefully accepted the decision of the commissioners and rented the building to the county until the second courthouse was built.

In 1851 the second courthouse, valued at \$300, was insured against fire for a three-year premium of \$4.50. Unlike the fate of many other courthouses in Iowa, the second Iowa County courthouse was not destroyed by fire but rather, was outgrown.

The third courthouse was authorized in 1861 and was built of brick. The authorization required that the building be as large as its \$2,000 appropriation would allow. An addition was added in 1869, but the structure was outgrown soon after, nonetheless.

In 1891, an election was held to see if the voters of the county would favor the construction of a new county courthouse. Those favoring construction of a new facility won by a narrow three percent of the votes cast. In order to raise the money necessary for the new construction Iowa County sold at auction swamplands which it owned in Ida and Cherokee counties. The money raised totaled nearly \$50,000, which was more than \$3,000 in excess of the appraised value of the land. The present courthouse was built for \$57,608.16, and was dedicated on December 20, 1893. The tower is 137 feet high. The building is a two-story structure made of Berea stone and is 93 feet by 74 feet in size.
