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Narrative Description

The United Brethren Church is located on a country road 4.5 miles northeast of Spink, South Dakota in Spink Township. The Big Sioux River flows approximately 5 miles east of the church. It is located in a very rural area with very few houses in the immediate area. The United Brethren Church is an excellent example of a rural country church in Union County.

Architectural Description:

The United Brethren Church, built in 1905, is a gable front clapboard building with a steeple in the center of the façade. The one and one-half story frame building was constructed on a clay tile foundation. The façade (east elevation) of the church has a double entry door with a two pane transom in the steeple. Above the doorway is a simple, decorative pediment. Concrete steps lead up to this entryway. Located approximately two feet up the steeple is a decorative Gothic arch wooden detail. The steeple is topped with a four sided bell tower. Each side has two narrow arched openings with louvers. Above the arches is a triangular pediment, which leads to an asphalt shingled octagonal roof that rises to a peak crowned with a simple Christian cross.

The north and south elevations have three evenly spaced hopper windows at the basement level. Directly above each of the basement windows is a one-over-one double hung window. Each has a simple decorative window moulding with a small peak in the middle of each window moulding. The south elevation also has a wood entry door at the southeast corner.

The west elevation has a historic shed roof addition. The west wall of this addition has an entry door at the southwest corner and three, three paned hopper windows at the basement level. The south wall of this shed roof addition has a three paned hopper window at the basement level.

Interior:

The main floor of the sanctuary is one large room with very little decoration. The west end of the sanctuary has a modest handrail and pulpit. The church has a simple vaulted ceiling. The church's full basement has a Sunday School room and a modest kitchen at the rear of the building.

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Privy:

To the rear of the property sits a clapboard sided asphalt shingled shed roof WPA privy. There is a single door on the east elevation with a signature WPA square window near the door.

Cemetery:

Located to the south of the church is a cemetery laid out on a grid pattern. The earliest internment dates to the middle 1880's. It remains an active cemetery. At the gate to the cemetery is an iron arch entryway with "PLEASEANT HILL CEMETERY" in the arch.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The United Brethren Church is significant under criterion C as a well-preserved example of simplified vernacular late gothic revival architectural style and represents the first generation church construction in the eastern part of South Dakota.

The early 1870s saw the settlement of Spink Township in Union County. The Wade, Goodroad and Heasley families developed the area and started the first school. The families of Pleasant Hill paid for the construction of a school, which would also function as a Sunday School facility. The United Brethern Methodist Church took over the operations of the Sunday School classes after the Wade family moved to a new community. The congregation members and church organization raised enough funds to construct two churches in the Vermillion Circuit, as this region was termed. The first church was constructed in Clay County called the Star Prairie Church in 1897 and in 1905 the United Brethern Church was constructed in Union County thus making the circuit complete.

The United Brethren Church is significant under Criterion C as is typifies the "first generation" of church construction in eastern South Dakota. Scholars of church architecture in the Great Plains have divided the evolution of church buildings in the region into several distinct phases. These phases tend to happen in generational cycles and so they have been termed generations. Typically a parish or congregation would be established in a given area as soon as there was sufficient population. As its first order of business, a newly organized church body constructed a suitable church building. As a result, most of the initial or first generation churches were simple frame

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buildings constructed by local carpenters or builders. In eastern South Dakota, first generation churches tend to date from the late 19th to early 20th century with most buildings constructed during the Great Dakota Boom, 1878-1887.

The church retains a high degree of architectural integrity and has suffered few alterations. The west elevation has a shed roof addition that was made in an historic time frame. The privy is still at its original location. Few examples of this building type with a high degree of integrity remain in South Dakota. Many have suffered alterations such as modern siding, new windows and removal of the steeple. The United Brethren Church survives as an excellent example of this vernacular building type.

The United Brethren Church is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C as an excellent example of a first generation, vernacular late gothic revival building. It is also significant as the only remaining church from the Vermillion Circuit.
