Describe present and historic physical appearance.

This two story limestone building from c.1855 is rectangular in shape, measuring 22'x62', with the narrow end of the rectangle facing the street. It has a flat roof which slopes gently to the rear. The three bay facade features two large display windows and a door offset to the right at the street level, and three windows across the second floor. The entrance is recessed. Like the Herald Building next door, the storefront is of stone, not iron. Stonework is of stone blocks laid in courses, the blocks varying somewhat in size and shape. The blocks average approximately 8"x15". Dressed stone lintels are located above all openings. A simple denticulated cornice caps the building.

The only apparent alterations to this building concern the windows. Slightly smaller windows have been installed at the second floor. The street level display windows have been shortened. The width appears to have been left intact, and the transom sections appear original, it is only the bottom of the windows that have been changed. The overall character of this stone building has not been adversely affected by these changes. The use of limestone as a building material was the focus for this survey, and emphasis was on exteriors. The interior of this building has not been addressed.

This building is located on the west side of Riverview, facing the Mississippi River. From the front you can look across the street, through the City Park, to the river itself. This is the area known as the levee in the 19th century, and has always been an open space. A block to the north, and a block to the south, limestone warehouses are found on the east side of the street, with their rear walls fronting on the river. Riverview was called Front and/or Water Street in the 19th century. Many of the businesses along it were directly related to the river traffic.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This building is significant under Criterion C as an example of a limestone commercial building from c.1855.

217 limestone buildings and structures were recorded in Jackson County, twenty of which are commercial buildings (including this one). These commercial buildings appear to have been constructed between c.1850 and c.1870, with the majority (thirteen) located in the town of Bellevue. Bellevue was surveyed and platted in 1835, though land sales did not begin until 1844. The community was named as county seat in 1837, and was an active trading center from that time on. Some of the earliest commercial buildings in the county are located in Bellevue, the building in question being one of these.

This two story limestone building is a good example of commercial design from the 1850s. The original function has not been determined, but size and location would indicate it was a retail establishment. Rectangular in shape, it features a narrow three bay facade, with the entrance offset to the right. This door is recessed, and transoms are found above the door and display windows. Three small windows are located on the second floor. The stonework on this building is consistent with that commonly found during this period: coursed stone blocks of varying sizes (approximately 8"x15"), with dressed stone lintels and watertable. The building retains a high level of integrity.

In many Iowa towns along the Mississippi River, the earliest commercial buildings of masonry construction feature the use of limestone (or heavy timber) lintels rather than arches. In general, it appears that lintels were used until c.1860, then arches became the common method of construction. The stone lintels served not only a functional purpose, but in brick construction, became a design element as well because of the difference in color and texture. With few exceptions, the commercial buildings from the 1830s through the 1850s were vernacular in design, though the lintels, and the often symmetrical facades, gave a hint of the Greek Revival or Federal style to the buildings. The limestone commercial buildings of Bellevue are significant examples of this period and building type.


