DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Zion Church has remained relatively unchanged since its erection in 1849. This rectangular brick structure, built on a Tennessee limestone foundation, contains one story and a basement. The overall dimensions are 80'4" x 50'1". The solid masonry walls, made of natural brick laid in common bond, have stepped parapets on the north and south ends. A recessed porch is located on the south end with two square columns supporting the upper wall. Eight supporting rods run through the building and are evident by the traditional star-shaped caps that decorate the south end of the structure. The roof is of composition shingles and five brick chimneys are visible above it. The building has four panel solid wooden doors and windows of stained glass that are 1/1 double hung with operable shutters.

Two doors enter directly into the sanctuary from the south end, one on either side of the pulpit. Stairways either side of the entry doors wind around modern toilets to the balcony. The ten-foot wide balcony is continuous on all but the altar wall. The walls and ceiling are painted plaster and the floor has carpet over a wooden floor. The basement contains the mechanical equipment room, kitchen, a large room and toilets. The basement has an exterior entrance on the east side.



Zion church, used since its erection as a house for religious services, reflects in its architecture, stern tenets of the presbyterian community for which it was built. Its decoration is limited to such structural adornment as its stepped gables, but it is representative of the sound and stable community of means that built it.

Descendants of John Knox migrated from Ireland and Scotland to South Carolina in 1731. In 1805-6 eleven families moved westward to Maury County, Tennessee. They organized and built Zion Presbyterian Church in 1807 on their 5,120 acres of land purchased from the heirs of Gen. Nathanael Greene, who received 25,000 acres now in Maury County for his services in the Revolutionary War. Here these pioneer settlers erected their homes and built a church. The first building of logs served six years, the second of brick served until 1849, when this church was completed at a cost of seven thousand dollars. It has served as a religious and social center of the community to the present time.
