Historic Resources of Pewee Valley MPL Bondurant-Hustin House

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Description

The Bondurant-Hustin House (OL-335) is a c. 1885 Queen Anne-influenced house located within the area of the Historic Resources of Pewee Valley Multiple Property Listing at 104 Castlewood Drive. The two-story wood-framed house sits near the center of a four-acre lot which retains much of its historic landscaping. A fine historic and contributing carriage house and a 1960s garage are the only outbuildings associated with the house. The open, nearly level property is bounded by Houston Lane on the southwest and Rest Cottage Lane on the northeast. It sits well back from Mt. Mercy Drive on Castlewood Drive which serves as a driveway for it and a cluster of three non-historic houses built in the 1970s on what used to be the front of the property. Behind the house is a five-acre vacant lot that at one point was associated with the house. The Bondurant-Hustin House property is well-maintained and in good condition.

The house has an asymmetrical plan, weatherboard siding and a hipped roof with projecting gable wings. A round tower with a conical roof that extends above the main roofline is located at the south front corner. A wraparound front porch has delicate Tuscan Columns for supports. Detailing consists of fishscale shingles in the gable ends and around the entire tower, a main entrance with a bold bracketed cornice above the door, and a small stained-glass window in a cut-away corner area on the first floor. Windows are one-over-one double hung sash flanked by historic louvered blinds. The foundation is limestone block with beaded joints. Rear additions include a historic, although not original, two-story wing and beyond that a non-historic one-story bathroom and porch ell.

On the interior, the first floor of the asymmetically planned house consists of an entrance hall, stairhall, parlor, dining room, and what used to be the kitchen. The present kitchen is located in the historic rear addition. Simple detailing consists of door and window surrounds with bulls-eye corner blocks and a Colonial Revival-influenced mantel in the parlor.

The approximately square property is open and generally level, although it slopes down gently to a small pond in its south corner. Historic landscaping includes grass and scattered shade trees, evergreen, and shrubs. A wide loop of the historic driveway which circles in front of the house is included within the present lot. The remainder of the long drive marked by historic gateposts at Mt. Mercy Drive now serves non-historic houses as well as the Bondurant-Hustin House and is no longer an integral part of the property.

Set back from the house near its north rear corner are the adjacent garage and carriage house. The 1960s garage is a gable-roofed concrete block structure. The fine two-story carriage house, built about 1870, has board-and-batten siding and a gable roof with a front cross gable. It is detailed with bargeboards, a cornice formed of a row of saw-tooth shingles, and diamond-shaped, circular, pointed-arched, and rectangular vents and window openings infilled with wood lattice work.

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Statement of Significance

The Bondurant-Hustin House (OL-335) is an important residential property individually nominated as part of the Historic Resources of Pewee Valley Multiple Property Listing. The c. 1885 house and grounds are eligible for the National Register under Criteria A and C. The house is a good representation of the property type residential buildings developed in conjunction with the historic context, Suburban Development in Pewee Valley, 1851-1935. It has been evaluated to meet the registration requirements established for individual listing within the residential buildings property type. Its period of significance dates to the time of its construction, about 1885.

In terms of Criterion A and the area of significance, Suburban Development, the Bondurant-Hustin house is important as a manifestation of the suburban development that occurred in Pewee Valley in the last decades of the nineteenth century. This house, built about 1885, represents one of the relatively few houses built during the 1880s, a period of little construction activity between the much more active 1870s and the late 1890s and early 1900s. The property with its large house, extant carriage house, and historic landscaping features including mature trees, a pond, and a circular drive, documents many of the features commonly associated with the country estates that played such an important role in Pewee Valley's history. The house is pictured in Beautiful Pewee Valley, the c. 1909 promotional booklet on Pewee Valley that sought to encourage both year-round and summer living in the community.

In terms of Criterion C and the area of significance, Architecture, the house is important as one of the few and as one of the best examples of Queen Anne-influenced residential architecture in Pewee Valley. Although not a classic example of the Queen Anne style, many of the elements of the Bondurant-Hustin House, including the hipped roof with gabled projection, the asymmetrical plan, the wraparound porch, the shingle work, and most important, the round corner tower with its conical roof combine to reflect a strong Queen Anne influence. The extant two-story carriage house with its board-and-batten siding, bargeboards, and other decorative detailing is one of the finest remaining outbuildings in Pewee Valley. It is an excellent example of this type of building that played such an important role in the functioning of nineteenth and early twentieth century residential properties in Pewee Valley.

Although a house existed on the site of the Bondurant-Hustin house by 1879, stylistic analysis and deed research suggest that the present house dates from about 1885 and the ownership of Myra and J. D. Bondurant who purchased the nine-acre property in 1883 for \$1,500. Five years later, in 1888, it was sold to Septima Hustin, wife of Philip P. Hustin, for \$3,000. The rapid increase in price strongly suggests the construction of a house in the intervening years. The Hustins, who added an additional five acres to the property, were owners until 1894 after which time the house changed hands frequently up to the present



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day. Nothing is known of the Bondurants. Philip P. Hustin served on the Pewee Valley City Council in 1889 and from 1891 until 1896.




