Architectural Statement: The Elliott house stands two stories plus attic above a cut limestone foundation. The nucleus of the design is a cubical mass, covered by a truncated hip roof from which gable roofed wings project to the north, east and west. The gable end oriented to the east contains a one story bay window, (with iron cresting above the roof shingles) and a rectangular bay at the second story level. Architectural statement: continued

Apparently at the turn of the century this Victorian Picturesque house was remodeled, transformed into an interesting Queen Anne design. The two and one half story tower, capped by a bulbous roof, was added as was the fieldstone porch. Split fieldstones form piers which support the porch roof; smaller turned posts flank the piers and support arched screens.

Architectural Significance:

The Elliott House is architecturally significant as an example of a period of construction and is an excellent example of the local interpretation of the Queen Anne Style. The Elliott house is distinguished from other Queen Anne designs in Waukesha by the massive porch constructed of local fieldstone, which contrasts with the more delicate treatment of the building surface.
