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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hans Gram House is located two blocks east of the central business district on the western edge of Neenah's mansion district. Situated on the southwest corner of East Wisconsin Avenue and Elm Street, the building is a two-story wood-frame residence with Queen Anne and Italianate references. The plan configuration is rectangular with projecting pavilions and a rear wing. The roof is low-pitched and its form is combination hip and gable. foundations are rock-faced ashlar limestone, the siding is clapboard, and the shingles are hexagonal asbestos. The windows are double-hung, single-paned sash; accompanying shutters are not functional but are believed to have replaced functioning originals. The gable end shingles are imbricated, the soffit is enriched by incised brackets, and the peaked window headers are incised with a star motif. The front stoop and side porches have turned supports with spindled balustrades and grilles. The porch roofs, while only having one slope, suggest the Mansard form. A large integral porch on the second floor encompasses the projecting pavilion on the east facade.

The modest interior follows a side hall plan with kitchen and pantry in the rear wing. French doors have replaced paneled doors between the front and back parlors, and the kitchen has been remodeled at various times.

The garage located near the southwest corner of the property is from the early 20th century and is a non-contributing building.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hans Gram House is of local architectural significance as a fine example of the late Victorian Italianate period of construction.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

Hans Gram operated a dry goods store in the Russell House Hotel with P. H. Miller. His home on Wisconsin Avenue was built in 1887 and occupied by his children until the 1960's. The Grams were part of the Scandinavian community, which by 1885 accounted for nearly half of Neenah's immigrant population.

ARCHITECTURE

The Hans Gram House is of local architectural significance as a fine example of late Victorian Italianate architecture period of construction. The era inwhich it was built was one of great local prosperity, notable for the construction of the fine mansions located in the immediate neighborhood. The Gram house is significantly smaller and less pretentious than its neighbors, yet it is distinguished by such Queen Anne features as the delicate spindlework and imbricated gable shingles. The Gram house is further enriched by the suggested mansard porch roofs, brackets, and incised window headers from the Italianate mode. The handsome result of this combination compares favorably with the fine residences of Neenah's 19th century industrialists.

Other local examples of late Victorian Italianate period of construction can be found at 419 Church Street, 120 E. Franklin Street, and 105 N. Park Avenue. Another example at 112 E. Columbian Avenue was recently demolished. Common features are a central gable, incised headers, low-pitched roofs, high foundations and a side hall plan. All but one is of frame construction. The frame examples were resided with shingles in the 20th century, while a large cast concrete verandah was attached to the brick house at 120 E. Franklin. All appear to have lost ornamental features which distinguish the Hans Gram House.
