Describe present and historic physical appearance.

This one and one-half story brick residence is located on the east side of North Main Street, approximately one block north of the business district. Resting on a limestone foundation and watertable, the basic plan of the house is rectangular with cross gable wings. A mansard roof is used on a wing to the rear and a small corner area at the front. The south elevation features a gambrel dormer, and a single story polygonal bay window. The gable (and gambrel) ends have decorative Stick Style trusses. It is the use of cream colored brick as a decorative element that is significant. The brick is used in the segmental arches above the windows, and on the corners in a quoin-like manner. This is one of four houses in Maquoketa with this type of brick detailing. Two of these houses are altered and do not appear eligible for the National Register. The fourth is the Alexander Organ residence at 607 West Summit.

A historic photograph shows the major alterations to this house to be a remodeled porch in front, and rebuilt chimneys. A detached garage is located at the back of the lot. The neighborhood has changed over the years. Commercialism is creeping north on Main Street, and the area is no longer strictly residential. These changes do not appear great enough to negate eligibility.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This residence is significant under criterion C as it illustrates an unusual architectural design (use of cream colored decorative brick as part of the "quoined corner" group). It is representative of the houses built for local businessmen during the "Boom Years," that period in Maquoketa's history when the community grew rapidly due to the arrival of the railroads in 1870 and the designation as the county seat in 1873.

This residence is important as one of only four houses in town with light colored brick quoins. This decorative brick treatment is continued in the segmental arches obove the windows which alternate cream colored and regular red bricks. These houses with the brick "quoins" must have been influenced by the residences with the limestone quoins which were built between 1877 and 1896. No architect or builder has been specifically identified, but it is possible that John Lake may have been the builder responsible. He used a similar brick treatment on the I.O.O.F. Building in 1886, and while his own house featured stone quoins, it has a similar roof shape, complete with the gambrel dormer. The use of a mansard roof on portions of the house is not unique, several other examples have been identified in Maquoketa, but the houses were not otherwise significant.

Although it has not been determined if this house was originally built for W.B. Swigert, it is known that he was a long-time inhabitant of it. The Swigert family holds an important place in Maquoketa's history, as publishers of the <u>Sentinel</u>. The first issue of the <u>Maquoketa</u> <u>Sentinel</u> was published on June 1, 1854. It was just four pages, with seven columns to a page, but it was a newspaper for the fledgling town. Later renamed the <u>Jackson Sentinel</u>, the Swigert newspaper was a force in the developemnt of Maquoketa and Jackson County during the years. Other newspapers came and went (the <u>Maquoketa Excelsior</u>, <u>Maquoketa Record</u>, <u>Maquoketa Independent</u>, and even a German language paper <u>Der</u> <u>Jackson Demokrat</u>) but the Swigert family, and the <u>Sentinel</u> set the standards. The Sentinel continues today as part of the Maquoketa News.


