

This small pond is virtually the only representative of the dozens of fishponds that once abounded in Pearl Harbor. The pond has been variously called Okiolepe, Okiokalipi, Oneokalepa Okiokalepa and Okiokilepe; the last of these seems more generally accepted. The pond is located in the rather narrow channel leading from the ocean into the interior of Pearl Harbor. On its banks grow mangrove, kiawe and mamani trees while naval debris floats against the wall and within the pond itself.

Okiokilepe is small, covering only a few acres, but is unique among the ponds that remain in good condition on Oahu because its wall is constructed of coral chunks. Made by stacking the coral blocks, the wall is more narrow than that of any other fishpond remaining in the same good condition. The 200 meter long wall is broken in several places and no evidence of the original makaha, sluice gates, is visible. Today this once white wall is smeared with the heavy oil floating in Pearl Harbor.



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The primary significance of Okiokilepe Fishpond is that it is virtually the only fishpond left in the Pearl Harbor area where once there were many, many more. The fishponds of Pearl Harbor must once have rivaled those of Kaneohe Bay on windward Oahu in their importance. Yet today Okiokilepe is the only one of these remaining in good condition in leeward Oahu and near the urban center of Honolulu.

Okiokilepe also derives much of its significance from its manner of construction, being built of stacked coral chunks instead of the stone faced and filled walls of fishponds in Kaneohe Bay.

The acceptance of Okiokilepe to the National Register would encourage the Department of the Navy to take measures to preserve the pond and, perhaps, open it to the public.
