Describe present and historic physical appearance.

EXTERIOR DESCRIPTION

Located on the south side of Main, elevated some three feet above street level, this house occupies a double lot. The main entry to the house faces north. A one-and-one-half story building, the main dimensions are approximately 45 feet by 35 feet. The house is built on a concrete foundation with a full basement. The roof consists of a central bellcast gable oriented on an east-west axis, or parallel to the street. Several dormers project from the gable roof; a bellcast-hipped gable facing north, and three shed dormers to the rear. The entire roof is covered with composition shingles. One red-brick chimney rises through the roof on the western end.

The gable ends and the small areas between the numerous windows on the first floor level are clad with rectangular shingles. The ground level exterior surface, below the first level, has variegated shingles. The predominant window type consists of one-over-one double-hung sash. Large bay windows and casements also appear on the various elevations. Faceboards surround all of these windows and have detailed lintels and sills. The dormers to the rear have paired and single one-over-one double-hung sash windows. The exposed gable end to the west has minor ornamentation. Above the attic casement windows there appear three elongated triangular relief ornaments. Between the two large windows on the second level, a diamond executed in shingles increases the visual aesthetics of the gable end. On the first floor of the western elevation, leaded bevel-glass windows flank the chimney. This central area of the elevation is recessed, due to the use of polygonal bays on the corners.

The most dramatic feature of the facade is the sweeping wrap-around porch with turned, Tuscan supports on the main elevation. The porch is surrounded by an enclosed, shingled balustrade pierced with scuppers for run-off. The original front entrance is intact - a panelled door with a single glass pane in its

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upper portion has sidelights on either side and a bottom-hinged, leaded glass transom light above. All large picture windows on this level are surmounted by transom lights. Three corners of the first floor plan have polygonal bays, giving the first floor level an interesting and varied form. The bellcasthipped gable dormer is directly over the main entry; it is accented by three one-over-one double-hung sash windows and has elongated eave brackets adding embellishment.

An outbuilding with gable roof and bevelled shiplap is located in the southeast corner of the lot; and has always been used for storage. Along the front yard, a two-foot high stone retaining wall sets the house off from the street level. Concrete steps lead up from the sidewalk to another group that provides access to the porch. The only exterior alteration occurred when prior tenants enclosed part of the wrap-around porch on the eastern side where they covered over two Tuscan supports with shingles.

INTERIOR DESCRIPTION

A longitudinal central hall bisects the interior of the house. The living room and dining room are located on the west side of the hall. A kitchen and bedroom are on the east side. Rectangular corner bays project from the two front rooms. The house has a full basement.

The finishwork is exceptionally fine, particularly in the central hall. The main entrance and staircase are especially noteworthy. Glazed sidelights with raised square and rectangular panels flank the front door. The leaded glass transom has the number "1000" etched in the center pane. Tuscan columns, square engaged pilasters and molded newel posts enhance the staircase, which has a small bench with a hinged top for storage at its base. Pocket doors separate the living room from the hall. Baseboards have crown moldings. Ornate brass duct covers and picture molding are also intact. A brick-faced living room fireplace with radiating voussoirs is flanked by built-ins and leaded, bevelled glass fixed sashed windows. A "hidden" cupboard is located on the right side of the mantle.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Edward Dupont Residence, constructed in 1905, is locally significant under criterion C as an exceedingly fine example of an eclectic stylistic type incorporating elements of the Craftsman and Shingle styles. The Shingle style was an unusually free-form and variable style, and without the hallmark shingle siding it is difficult to categorize its many diverse expressions. In general the style was never widely adapted to mass vernacular housing. In fact, the particular form which this house takes is uncommon to the study area--only twelve are included in this survey, all of which were constructed between approximately 1899 and 1905. Of these twelve the Dupont House is one of two which are considered potentially eligible for the National Register, the others being lesser representatives of the type or having lost some amount of physical integrity. The date of construction was established by tax assessor records and confirmed by deed records and city directories.

Shingle style qualities are displayed in the broad sweep of the side-gabled eaveless roof and characteristic shingle siding. The smooth wall surface, interrupted by the slightly projecting portion of the upper gable end with elongated triangular relief at the window head, is also associated with the style. Other Shingle style elements include the classical columns supporting the recessed front porch; the elegantly paneled and glazed door with sidelights and leaded glass transom; and the bay windows on the facade. The interior is striking in its elegant use of Victorian period finishes. Particularly noteworthy is the central hall with its arcaded openings and the richly detailed open staircase. 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The Craftsman style is seen in the strong horizontal emphasis, prominent dormer with deep eaves and exposed rafters, as well as the expansive encircling porch.

The original owner of the house was Mary Hodgson who owned the property from 1904 to approximately 1927. It is not known if she ever lived in the dwelling. In 1927 her estate sold the house to Edward and Florence Dupont for whom the house is named. Edward Dupont was born in Canada in 1863. At the age of seventeen he left home to embark on a series of different careers which eventually led him to Portland. The Dupont's lived in the house until 1939 when it was sold to Anna Larson.
