DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

SUMMARY OF PRESENT AND ORIGINAL PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The one-and-12-story, wood-frame bungalow located at 3315 Bayshore Road, was constructed of pre-fabricated materials ordered from Sears Roebuck of Chicago, and was built by prominent local contractor H.K. Browning for Chicagoan Captain W. F. Purdy during the winter season of 1911-1912. The plan of the building is "U"-shaped with projecting irregular wings located at the east elevation. The western or bay elevation is of primary importance consisting of six-bay verandah with gable roofed, pair of triple windowed dormers, decorated with Tudor-arched bargeboards. The Bay elevation is sheathed in green stained shingles; while the north, south and east elevations are clapboarded. The bungalow, site, original outbuildings and landscaping are remarkable intact. Outbuildings include: original wooden water cistern, 1-story wood-frame garage and large 1-story, wood-frame shed. Original planting includes cocoanut and Canary Island date palms.

TEXT SUPPORTING SUMMARY OF PRESENT ORIGINAL PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The $1-\frac{1}{2}$ story bungalow located at #3315 Bayshore Road of 1911 was described in the contemporary press as follows: "One of the most handsome bungalows on the bay is being built for Captain W. F. Purdy at Indian Beach by contractor H.K. Browning. The building has seven rooms, a frontage of nearly 100 feet with wings extending from the rear. The ma terial was purchased in Chicago by Captain Purdy, and the interior will be finished ir modern style."1 According to his niece, Mrs. Sumner Britton, Captain Purdy purchased the materials from the building department of Sears and Roebuck of Chicago.² The plan of the bungalow is "U"-shaped with irregular wings located at the east elevation. The woodframe construction bungalow, rests on a foundation of brick piers with wood lattice in-fill. Wood shingles stained green appear at the west or bay elevation; while clapboards (once stained a redwood color -- now painted white) are the primary fabric of the east, north and south elevations. A fireproof, one-story brick lean-to is located at the north-east elevation of the bungalow. The main gabled roof intersects with secondary gabled roofs of the wings located at the north and south ends of the east elevation. Smaller, one-story additions and two-story open porch have shed roofs. Two gabled dormer windows with Tudor-arched bargeboards pierce the raking slope of the main gabled roof. Fenestration is irregular. Window types include: double-hung-sashed, 9/1 windows; 10-pane wood casement windows; two dormers each with a set of three single pane windows with multi-light surrounds, located at the west elevation; a triple window with central pointed arch at the gable end of the north elevation. The most prominent exterior feature is the six-bay verandah located at the west or bay elevation. The porch piers are supported on brick bases. The piers are sheathed in shingle. The verandah openings are Tudor-arched. Approached by a wooden staircase with turned balister and straight railings, the verandah provides the formal progression to the main entrance door.

Site Features and Outbuildings: The original water cistern for the property is located at the east elevation of the Purdy Residence, (at the intersection of the south wing). Original outbuildings include: a one-story gabled roof garage (wood-frame, desolate, but salvageable) located at the southern extremity of the property; and a large, onestory shed (tumble-down) located at the north property line. Original exotic plant materials include a row of cocoanut palms which mark the water line; as well as several Canary Island Date Palms which accent the west facade of the Captain W.F. Purdy Residence. A later pink-tinted drive-way approaches the bungalow from Bayshore Road. **8** SIGNIFICANCE

SUMMARY OF STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Number 3315 Bayshore Road is one of the first documented Sears Roebuck Company "prefab." material structures to have been built in Sarasota. Built between December 1911 and the winter season of 1912, the shingle and clapboard bungalow is representative of the second period of Sarasota development (1900 - 1913).³ The influx of mid-Western seasonal residents and the decision on the part of the Captain W.F. Purdy family of Chicago to build a residence is also indicative of Captain Purdy's efforts to oversee his avocado farms located across the Bay on Longboat Key.⁴ The Purdy family became influential Sarasota residents. Captain Purdy trained the Sarasota Naval Militia and led the militia to England during World War I.⁵ H.K. Browning who arrived as a Scots or Ormiston colonist supervised the construction of #3315 Bayshore Road. H.K. Browning was one of very few local architects and craftsmen. He served as a member of the Council during the early years of the incorporated Town of Sarasota.⁶ The property and improvements are remarkably intact including: the "U"-shaped bungalow, 1-story shed, garage, water cistern and exotic palms.

TEXT SUPPORTING SUMMARY OF STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built between December of 1911 and early winter of 1912, the one-and-one-half story shingle and clapboard bungalow, located at 3315 Bayshore Road is representative of residential construction of the second period of development of Sarasota which occurred 1900 - 1913. The influx of mid-Western seasonal visitors is evident in the arrival of Captain W.F. Purdy and family and their decision to build in the Indian Beach section. The Indian Beach site overlooked Captain Purdy's agricultural tract of twenty acres "on Longboat Key which were set to Avocado Pears". At the time of construction the building was described as "One of the most handsome bungalows on the Bay" with "seven rooms, a frontage of nearly 100 feet with wings extending from the rear.... material...purchased in Chicago...and the interior finished in modern style."⁰ The building materials were purchased from Sears Roebuck of Chicago.² H.K. Browning constructed the bungalow, integrating design and materials. Of particular note are: the six-bay verandah with Tudor-arched porch openings and the pair of triple windowed dormer projections located on the bay or west elevation; screened porches and water cistern at the east elevation; and the bracketed gabled ends of the north and south facades, pierced by tiny pointed-arched window openings. The bungalow is not only significant in design and materials but in site integrity: the original water cistern, one-story shed, early garage, and Canary Island Date Palms are vestiges of the Purdy era.

Captain W. F. Purdy was captain of the Illinois Naval Reserves until retirement brought him to Sarasota. TEXT OF SIGNIFICANCE cont.

H.K. Browning the architect/builder of 3315 Bayshore Road was the brother of Alex Browning, architect and author of the 1932 Browning Manuscript documenting the Ormiston Colony. In 1885, Alex and Hugh or H.K. Browning arrived with their parents as part of the Ormiston Colony from Scotland. H.K. Browning moved to Chicago "where he studied architecture", returning to Sarasota around 1910.¹² Browning was clearly familiar with Craftsman bungalow styles and he was active in residential and commercial building including the Watrous block on Main Street.¹³ His remodelling commisions included the home of Charles Ringling, R.C. Caples' bungalow and John Ringling's first seasonal house.¹⁴ Browning left Sarasota in 1916 for New Jersey, where he "was engaged in the brick manufacturing business", returning to the area in 1927, he died in 1937.¹⁵ In addition to his architectural achievements, Mr. Browning served as a member of the Town Council.¹⁶

Preservation Threat: Although the Purdy residence and site are remarkably intact, the 2.9 acre tract of Bay-front property on which this early documented "pre-fab." bungalow sits is of primary marketing interest. The marketers consider the bungalow structurally unsound and termite ridden. Based on exterior examination, there appears to be no evidence of structural fault; the building is supported on many brick piers. The verandah stairways and the exterior porches on the east elevation require remedial care, the shed is perhaps beyond repair but the garage may be salvable.
