

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The two ca. 1865 early shakopee residences at 411 and 419 East Second Street are located on the north side of the street between Spencer and Fillmore Streets. They face the railroad which runs down the center of the street and are located on the northern edge of a residential neighborhood. Directly north of the houses is Shakopee's major commercial strip.

The two adjacent residences are of similar size, massing, and construction. Both one and one half story buildings are constructed of local Shakopee brick (a soft red colored brick). Their plans are basically rectangular, and their gable roofs are oriented to the street.

411 East Second Street is situated close to the road. It is two bays across and three bays deep, and the entry is located in the central bay on the east side of the house facing the second house. A small one room brick section with a second doorway is located at the rear of the house. All windows are slightly arched. The house has two interior end chimneys.

419 East Second Street is situated back from the street and is narrower than 411. It has a bay window and entry porch on the street facade. The bay and adjacent porch include the primary decorative elements of the house: a turned column; tall narrow windows; white wood dentils, brackets, and stickwork. The one story brick room at the north end of the house also dates ca. 1865; the frame addition at the rear is of more recent construction.

The residences are well maintained and retain a significant degree of design integrity.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The two early Shakopee residences, dating ca. 1865, are significant as well-preserved residences representative of the style and construction that dominated early residential architecture in Shakopee. Characteristic features of Shakopee's residential architecture during the 1860's and 70's are a simple vernacular design, modest proportions, and red brick construction. The two houses at 411 and 419 East Second Street are the city's most representative examples of these features. The integrity of the buildings is outstanding: coupled with their location on the railroad, they convey a striking sense of historic Shakopee. As workers' housing, the buildings changed hands frequently and little is known about the early owners. Examples of this characteristic type of early Shakopee housing are fast disappearing.
