Andrews Memorial Chapel is located in a rural setting in the city-owned Highland Park. It was moved to this site in 1971 and it now stands on block piers The structure is wood framed throughout and from all evidence it is heart pine. All concealed framing lumber is rough sawn, full dimension. Wood flooring is tongue and groove, apparently of pine and painted. exterior of the building is wood siding, in horizontal coursing, shiplap "novelty" siding with curved top The most unique feature of the structure is the roof framing. Wood trusses frame across the main room and carry two purlins on each side which in turn carry vertical rafters./ The roof decking is tongue and groove beaded siding, stained and varnished. The trusses are basically modified scissors trusses. roofing material is cement-asbestos shingles (red), but these are certainly not the original. / No evidence of the original roofing remains, but it is likely that it was wood shingle. Doorways are both arches and halfarches with scroll sawn casings and carefully kerfed and bent moldings. Decorative brass hinge plates indicate considerable age and are very likely the original hardware. / Windows are single-hung with right-angle straight arch heads.

Interior wall finishes are a painted wainscot of vertically applied double beaded siding. There is then a layer of plaster on wood strip lath to the eave level with double beaded siding from there up, stained and varnished. The main room is approximately 30 by 50 feet. The rose windows in both of the end gables are thought to be original to the building.

The main alteration of the building was the removal of the steeple. The general condition of the building is fair. There is no apparent damage to the roof structure, and the interior surfaces are in very good condition. The exterior siding, however, shows much damage. This is from the recent move and the effects of weather. The siding also shows nail damage from a previous stucco application. The gable shingles are in good condition.

This building is most interesting and a valuable example of early indigenous Florida architecture. The designer-builder showed imagination, coupled with admirable restraint, in his treatment of the fenestration, finished wall surfaces and particularly in the roof framing system.

"In the spring of 1871, according to public notice, a meeting was held at the schoolhouse, the usual place of worship, for the purpose of organizing a church." Since the arrival of the Rev. Mr. Brown from Virginia in 1868, the tiny congregation had been meeting in the log schoolhouse. In 1876, however, construction was begun on a new church building. The land for the church was given by Mr. B. W. Brown, at which time the name of the church was changed to Andrews Memorial. The naming was in honor of William Andrews, recently deceased, whose father pledged \$200 to the building fund if the church bore his name.

The tiny congregation continued to grow and many members wanted to build a new and larger church in the center of population. Before an agreement could be reached between the members, a parcel of land was given by Mr. William Tate at the southwest corner of Scotland Street and Highland Avenue. The new church was completed in 1888. There was never a formal dedication, but the name, Andrews Memorial Church, was transferred to the new location.

In 1926 Andrews Memorial Church became the Andrews Memorial Chapel and was moved down Highland Avenue to the rear of the church property to make room for the present sanctuary. The church changed its name to the First Presbyterian Church of Dunedin at that time.

Because of the architectural significance of this indigenous structure and since it is one of the few remaining nineteenth century structures in this rapidly expanding region of Florida, it is judged to be of adequate regional importance for placement on the National Register. There is a great deal of local interest in the preservation of this structure as evidenced by its recent move by the Dunedin Historical Society. The building is currently in the process of restoration to be used by this group as its headquarters.
