DESCRIPTION	The Decatur Methodist Church is a one story frame weatherboarded building with stone founda- tion and metal cross gable open return roof. A belltower rises from a pedimented recessed double leaf panelled entrance door. The belltower features a steeple with a pyramidal bellcast pressed tin roof and finial, pointed arched louvered belfry, and a rectangular band of latticework under the eaves. The original bell, purchased for \$25, remains in the bell- tower. The facade (east elevation) has a pointed arched transom with y-tracery over paired windows between 6 over 6 light windows. A one story 1930's frame addition joins the rear of the church, and a later one story brick addition was built in the 1960's.				
SIGNIFICANCE	The Decatur Methodist Church was organized about 1837, as the first Methodist Church in the town. No permanent structure was built until ca. 1859 when Joseph McCorkle donated lot #69 to the congregation for a church. By 1860, the Decatur Methodist Church formed the center or base of the Decatur Methodist Circuit which involved thirteen congregations and chapels throughout the county. As the size of the congregation grew, the Decatur Church grew in importance. An accounting of the Methodist population in Meigs County in 1973 showed that the Decatur Methodist Church, with 167 members, is the largest of the eight active congregations. Although buildings used for religious purposes are generally not eligible for the National Register, the Decatur Methodist Church is an exception because its primary

Significance: (continued) significance is derived from its architectural importance to Meigs County. One of three church buildings included in this multiple resource nomination, it serves to illustrate a varia- tion in type of these modest rural church build- ings. The 1859 little altered Decatur Metho- dist Church, with its pointed arch windows and steeple vents, is the only ecclesiastical build- ing in the county which demonstrates influence of the Gothic Revival period. Although built only nine years later than the Mt. Zion Church (#13), its architecture differs distinctively; Mt. Zion Church exemplifies the small rectan- gular meetinghouse type with Greek Revival per- iod influence in detailing. The Decatur Meth- odist Church differs from the ca.1890 rectan-
