DESCRIPTION

- 7a. Architectural style: Italianate
- 7b. Briefly describe the site or structure and describe any major alterations from its original condition:

Constructed of brick and three stories high, these Italianate style structures were built as a block of three stores. The entire principal facade is unified by brick pilasters supporting a bracketed cornice and round arched windows with decorative metal caps. The windows are double hung sash, except for the large plate glass . window above 187. Water Street. Only the third story windows in this block retain the original small pane lights. Similarly, only the original first floor cast iron pieces and cornice survive at the shop-front level, although 185 Water Street has turn of the century transom lights.

SIGNIFICANCE

19. Briefly state historical and/or architectural importance (include dates, events, and persons associated with the site.)

This building is locally significant as the last remaining commercial structure south of Bridge Street which escaped the terrible 1865 fire. Designed by Maine's leading architect, Francis Fassett, this block was built by Ruel Williams, one of the most important citizens Augusta produced in the nineteenth century. Williams built this block the year he died, after having served the State of Maine and the City of Augusta in a variety of capacities, public and private. Fassett, who designed the Congregational Church in Augusta (NR), was also the architect of several other blocks in Augusta, all of which have been destroyed1
