#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Lower Pargoud is a story-and-a-half frame Greek Revival plantation house located behind the Quachita River levee in southern Monroe. At one time the house had a rural setting, but it was engulfed by suburban development in the mid-twentieth century. Despite a few alterations, the house retains its National Register eligibility.

There is some controversy regarding Lower Pargoud's date of construction, A brick in the hearth of the central front room bears the inscribed date January 8, 1824. This, of course, seems impossible, given the fact that Lower Pargoud is a full fledged Greek Revival house, (The earliest examples of the Greek Revival style in northern Louisiana are from the 1830's; most examples are from the 1840's on.) Also, a deed dated 1830 and filed in 1840 mentions an existing house on the site. This 1830 date also seems a bit early given the architectural evidence. The house could certainly be no earlier than about 1835 because its timbers are circular sawn throughout. In our opinion, the earliest believable date for-Lower Pargoud would be the late 1830's; this assessment is based solely upon the architectural evidence.

The house has a front gallery and a more or less symmetrical plan, three rooms wide and two rooms deep. There is no hall. To the rear is a kitchen "L" wing which at one time was connected to the house by a breezeway. There was also an open rear gallery with a staircase leading to the upper half story,

The front features a central entrance door with a transom and side lights as well as a secondary entrance door with only a transom. The front gallery consists of six Doric posts with richly molded capitals, two pilasters, a plain balustrade, and an unusually deep entablature. The entablature is treated with horizontal, molded panels. At one time the area below the gallery floor had a similar decorative panel facing, but this feature deteriorated and was replaced by brickwork. The gallery ceiling has an unusual coffer treatment consisting of long narrow wood panels. The facade under the gallery is flush board,

The interiors are plainly finished except for the three remaining aedicule style mantels. These mantels are fairly typical of other comparable examples except that the cornices are oversized and feature a graceful, cove molded shape. Doors are of the four panel type (panels not raised) and windows are six over six.

The following changes have been made in the house since construction:

- 1. In the late nineteenth century one of the front windows was replaced by a door and all of the shutters were replaced.
- 2. In 1924 a milk house was moved up to the south side of the house and converted to bedroom space, It was set back somewhat; so the original facade stands forth,
- 3. The old kitchen "L" wing which at one time had a central dogtrot corridor has been reworked to provide for a dining room and a modern kitchen.

  - 4. The old rear gallery has been extended slightly to the rear and glazed in.

- 5. The original staircase has been moved within the old rear gallery space.
- 6. A wide doorway has been cut from the central room of the house into the enclosed rear gallery space.
- 7. Two rear dormers have been installed.
- 8. Two chimneys and one mantel have been lost.
- 9. Other changes have been previously mentioned such as the loss of the lower facade paneling and the loss of the breezeway.

#### ASSESSMENT OF INTEGRITY

Despite these changes, the house still easily retains its basic identity as a Greek Revival house as well as the specific features which contribute to its architectural significance. (See Item 8.)

Well to the rear of the house is a small relatively modern frame garage which, of course, is listed as a non-contributing element.

### 8. Significance

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Criterion C

Lower Pargoud is locally significant in the area of architecture as a superior example among a limited number of surviving Greek Revival plantation houses in Ouachita Parish.

It is not possible to determine exactly how many Greek Revival plantation houses there were in Ouachita Parish at one time. The 1860 census indicates that there were twelve slaveholdings in the parish of fifty or more slaves (all of which involved individuals who lived in the parish). Presumably there were also numerous slaveholdings of less than fifty. Hence it is a reasonable assumption that on the eve of the Civil War there were a fair number of plantation houses in the parish--twenty-five or thirty at least. It is also a reasonable assumption that those plantation houses, built in the decades before the Civil War, were in the Greek Revival style.

From among this group there are five surviving in Ouachita Parish today, according to survey records. All are story and a half galleried Greek Revival cottages. Of these, Lower Pargoud is one of the two most intact, retaining its original roofline, its original columns and gallery details, most of its original fenestration, and three of its four original mantels. Other examples have suffered alterations such as dormer and front gable additions, re-siding, column replacement, and loss of all mantels. In addition, Lower Pargoud is superior to the other surviving examples in that its exterior woodwork is more elaborate. Whereas the other examples have plain entablatures and plain gallery ceilings, at Lower Pargoud these areas are paneled. For these reasons, the house is of special importance in the Greek Revival architectural heritage of the parish.
