Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Power County Courthouse is a detached two-story public building that is sited at the end of a boulevard running through the American Falls park. The original L-shaped plan of the building has been modified with compatible side and rear additions. The original front elevation has five bays with a centered entrance. Attached to the north wall of the building, an addition adds a sixth bay to the front elevation. It is set back a few feet from the plane of the front wall. The building has a dark red-brown pressed brick veneer. The roof is flat. The concrete cornice, capping course, window sills and lintels, and inset entrance surround are painted white. Concrete capitals and dropped corner ornament mark the outset brick pilasters at the building's corners. Decorative brickwork includes soldier and rowlock courses above the concrete watercourse and below the While the building is basically a monumental, formally symmetrical cornice. Neoclassical style courthouse, the horizontal lines and contrasting bands of light and dark created by these features suggest the Prairie style locally popular during the period for domestic architecture.

Alterations to the building include side and rear additions that are compatible in style and that leave the original structure clearly discernible. All but the windows above the entrance to the building (which are four-over-one double hung sash flanking a fixed one-light window with transom) are recent and compatible replacement one-over-one metal sash. Also, replacing the original entry doors are double metal-frame doors. While the loss of original doors and windows has some effect on the building's integrity, the remaining original fabric conveys the important characteristics of Neoclassical and Prairie style, and the building conveys a sense of the period in which it was built as a part of the development of the new American Falls townsite.

The Power County Courthouse is significant under criterion "A" in the context of the development of county government in the state and locally and for its association with the development of American Falls as a part of an important The building is significant under criterion "C" in the Reclamation Act project. context of the architecture of Idaho's county courthouses and as a local example The building retains its original monumental of institutional architecture. massing and most of its Neoclassical/Prairie style features, including its brick veneer, concrete detailing, and five-bay front. The remaining original fabric conveys the important characteristics of Neoclassical and Prairie style, and the building conveys a sense of the period in which it was built as a part of the development of the new American Falls townsite.

Power County was created by the 1913 Idaho legislature as one of several Reclamation-era counties to form along the Snake River. However, the county did not acquire a courthouse until plans for construction of the American Falls Dam Reservoir forced the relocation of the city of American Falls to benchland and of the planned reservoir. The Power County Courthouse was completed in south December, 1925, as part of the planned reconstruction of American Falls, which was soon to be flooded under the American Falls Reservoir. Construction of the American Falls Dam and Reservoir was an \$8.5 million project with Federal The project, completed in 1927, was sponsorship under the Reclamation Act. designed to create storage for 1.7 million acre-feet of water for irrigated In anticipation of county growth agriculture in Power and surrounding counties. after completion of the dam and reservoir, a \$30,000 bond issue was passed to construct a modern courthouse building on a \$2500 site in Reclamation Addition Architect of the building was donated to the county by the Federal government.
