The building has been converted to county offices and entirely remodeled on the interior. Modifications to the exterior include enclosure of the porch with glass performed Statement

Its period of significance if from 1911 to 1961, the years in which it operated as a hotel.

Although the resort is a reminder of the Springs Era, its founding in 1911 almost postdates that period. In 1902, real estate agent John Weber came into possession of 200 acres of land on top of the Prospect Avenue Hill. He had the land on the market from that time until 1907 but was unable to sell it for development due to the large area of black mud on the property. In that year a visitor familiar with the mud baths of Europe suggested that use for the land. In February, 1911, Weber opened a thirty-room health resort specializing in the application of mud baths. The hotel prospered and eventually grew to 200 rooms. Weber invented a couch for giving mud baths which became an industry standard. In 1915 a golf course was added which is still operated by the County as Moor-Downs Golf Course. From 1925 to 1947 over 130,000 people received Weber's mud treatment and Waukesha became known for its unorthodox medical center. Weber sold the hotel in 1946 and after several other owners, the mud baths finally closed in 1961, victim to more sophisticated medical practices. The Moor Mud Baths was the first and largest of several such spas in the City and remained as an example by the Springs Era. (B, C) of the health resort industry spawned

In 1962, the hotel became Mt. St. Paul College and in 1972, a County Office Building.

While part of the college, a three story brick structure was added to the east side of the original hotel. A modern, metal-sided garage and a single-story frame clubhouse are also on the grounds; however, none of these modern buildings contribute to the significance of the nominate Addendum: Legal Description propert;
