DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The structure itself is a rectangular plan about 25 feet by 55 feet with a basement, first floor and attic. It is located on a steep cross-slope lot with a main entrance verandah across the end facing the highway below. It is surrounded by open, overgrown pastures. Exterior walls are solid fieldstone, 24 inches thick below and 21 inches above on the first floor. The stone is rough cut into irregular blocks and is laid up in irregular courses with wide mortar joints, achieving an unusually picturesque pattern. Interior construction is timber framing with a steep open gable roof. The original slate roof is now covered with corrugated iron and has narrow eaves.

The full basement is completely above ground on one long side and rear end where there is an entrance door at grade. It has earth floor, 7 foot open ceiling and 2 rows of 6 inch 'ohi'a¹ posts with 6 inch by 6 inch beams supporting the first floor joists. The first floor is a single open space with a wood floor and 2 inch by 12 inch joists spanning the full 24 foot width to carry the attic floor above.

There is a narrow steep wood ladder-type stairs to attic. The attic is a single open space under the sloping roof with a wood floor and open rafters. Single windows are located in the gable at each end.

Windows on the main floor are single wood casements in thick wood frames set into the stone walls. Basement windows are small open grilled vents. The main feature is the entrance verandah facing a steep side road leading up from the highway. It is an open 3 bay porch with stone base and steps, wood rail and posts and full wood-planked gable end above.

On the main entrance is a pair of vertical plank doors. There is also a side entrance on the upper slope with stone steps and a single plank door.

Architecturally, this is an especially interesting construction. It is picturesquely fitted into its sloping site, well-proportioned and unadorned, depending on its straightforward constructural components, skillfully handled for its quality.

The Greenwell store of Kona built in c. 1851 originally served as a store and post office. Nicholas Greenwell, the store's builder, also served as the area's postnaster as well as the area's general merchandiser. The building is the only commercial structure from this period left in Kona. It displays a unique commercial use of mortar and fieldstone. The building is still owned and maintained by Greenwell heirs.

H. Nicholas Greenwell was born in England in 1826. He sold his commission in the Army at age 23 and left for Australia to make a new start where he bought a sheep station. In 1849 he sailed to California in search for gold. He then came to Hawaii and worked in Kailua. In 1867 Mr. Greenwell returned to England to visit his family and on his way back to Hawaii stopped in the Caribbean. On the island of Monsarrat he met his bride Elizabeth Caroline Hall. They returned to Hawaii together, bringing a new variety of oranges found in Brazil. Nicholas Greenwell is remembered for his cultivation of navel oranges which he exported, and his buying and selling of sheep skins which he did through his store. He also became involved with dairies in the 1880's and later began extensive ranching. He and his wife had eleven children.

After serving community interests, the building was later used by the Greenwell ranch. It was turned into a ranch warehouse. In c. 1959 the interior was altered and the exterior portice and porch were added. The building's original slate roof was replaced with corrugated iron at that time. Plans are presently underway to donate the building to the Kona Historical Society, to be used as a general headquarters.
