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The William Little House is a one-and-a-half story, frame Queen Anne style cottage that rests upon a partial basement and brick piers and is surmounted by a steeply pitched, broken slope, gabled roof. The house faces northerly and consists of a one-and-a-half story main block and one-story rear ell. A bungalow style carport with gabled roof and battered box columns atop brick piers was added to the westerly side elevation about 1920.

The gabled roof of the house is pierced by a large central dormer porch flanked by a single dormer window. The dormer porch and dormer windows are inset into the broken slope of the roof and all three are surmounted by steeply pitched roofs with wide overhanging eaves echoing the pitch and eave treatment of the main roof. The dormer porch, dormer windows, and gable ends of the main block of the house all feature decorative vergeboards and shingled gable ends. On the dormer porch, the shingles are applied to create a central heart motif flanked by diamonds. Only the heart motif is expressed in the shingled gable ends of the dormers, and the gable ends of the house each feature three diamonds. The dormer windows have molded caps and are filled with twoover-two, double-hung sash. The dormer porch features bracketed turned posts linked by both a spindle frieze and turned baluster railing. Access to the second-story interior from the dormer porch is provided by a transomed doorway filled with a single-leaf, four-panel door, whose upper panels have been glazed.

The five-bay facade of the house is sheltered by an inset, nearly full-width gallery which features bracketed turned posts, spindle frieze, and turned baluster railing. The facade is finished in novelty siding with a baseboard and wainscoting of vertical beaded boards. Floor-length, two-over-four windows with molded caps, unmolded surrounds, and original shutter blinds flank the central doorway, which has a chamfered surround and is filled with a single-leaf door with glazed upper panel. The door is set within a transom and sidelights over fielded panels. The gable ends of the main block of the house are lighted on both the first and second story by paired window units, each filled with two-over-two, double-hung sash. The mid wall section between the upper and low windows is finished in vertical beaded board to echo the wainscoting of the facade.

A one-story rear ell contains the dining room and kitchen and features a gabled roof with undercut full-width gallery extending along the westerly elevation. The gallery is supported by bracketed

chamfered posts linked by a railing of rectangular-sectioned balusters. Transomed doorways with single-leaf four-panel doors and floor-length windows with two-over-four sash open onto the gallery.

The interior of the house retains its original millwork and a combination of beaded-board wall finishes with some rooms featuring a wainscoting. Doors are four-paneled and mantel pieces are wooden with mirrored tops that are typical of the Queen Anne style. The hallway and dining room are especially well trimmed with wainscoting and molded doorway surrounds with corner blocks, knee blocks and plinth blocks. The hallway has a straight-run staircase featuring a decoratively carved, square newel post and turned balusters. The dining room ceiling is decorated with a wooden ceiling center piece, molded cornice, and diagonal boards forming a pattern. The dining room also retains its original built-in china cabinet. Other interesting survivals include the original bathroom with two original plumbing fixtures and most of the original hardware.

Alterations to the house are minimal and include the removal of the western hall wall by a previous owner, the addition of a bungalow style porte cochere, and the enclosure of the rear porch to accommodate Dr. William Little's home medical practice.

Two dependency buildings have survived. The cook's house is located southeast of the main house and is a small, frame, gabled roof building that rests upon brick piers. A single-bay doorway is located on the facade and the side elevations are lighted by a single window unit filled with two-over-two, double-hung sash. The carriage house is located south of the main house and is a square frame building that has a pyramidal roof with finial, board-and-batten siding, overhanging eaves, and small, shed-roof additions on each side. The carriage openings have no door infill.

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The William Little House is a locally significant example of Queen Anne architecture that derives additional significance from its well documented construction, architectural integrity, survival of original dependency buildings, and association with one of the leading citizens of Wesson, Mississippi. The house was built 1894-95 for Dr. William Little by Wesson builder George Brasfield, and the construction is well documented in an account book that belonged to Dr. Little (William Little account book, xerox copy of original in the possession of Betty Youngblood of Boulder, Colorado, William Little House, Statewide Survey of Historic Sites, Mississippi Department of Archives and History, Jackson).

Dr. William L. Little recorded on June 29, 1894 that he has made the first payment of \$125.00 on his building lot to Mrs. Dr. Rev. Rea. Various costs were incurred in July to prepare the lot for building, including two charges of \$1.10 and \$2.40 for uprooting trees. Across the top of two pages is written:

George Brasfield in account with Dr. W. L. Little based on contract to build residence, do all paint and bricks tin work also build and paint front yard fence-for the sum of six hundred and eight five dollars, As per contract Aug-20/1894 \$685.00

Enochs Lumber and Manufacturing Company of Jackson, Mississippi, agreed to furnish all the materials for \$1,187.70. By April 1895, the house was nearing completion as charges were incurred that month in the amount of \$9.85 for "Painting rooms upstairs." Although George Brasfield is documented as the builder, it is unknown whether he drew the plans. Either Brasfield or Little may have based the design on a published plan in an architectural pattern book.

The William Little House is located in downtown Wesson and is one of the town's most architecturally significant residences. It retains its original one acre town lot and its two original dependency buildings—the cook's house and carriage house. The architectural integrity is compromised only by ca. 1920 rear porch enclosures made to accommodate Dr. Little's medical practice, by the addition of a bungalow style porte cochere, and by a previous owner's removal of the wall separating the stair hall from the parlor. Like most doctors in small town America, Dr. William Little was an important community leader in the manufacturing town of Wesson, which is located about fifty miles south of Jackson.

(A contextual report entitled "Victorian Queen Anne Architecture in Mississippi" by Richard J. Cawthon, 1991, rev. 1992, discusses the significance of Queen Anne architecture in the state and establishes standards for assessing their eligibility for the National Register. This house meets the standards of that report.)





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
