Summary

The Lakeport Carnegie Library was constructed in 1918. The Classical Revival style building is symmetrical in design and exhibits simple and dignified ornamentation which is consistent with Classical Revival Type C style architecture identified in the California Carnegie Library Multiple Property Submission. The library is located on 2.50-acre (approximate) property deeded to the town of Lakeport for a public park and to erect a public library. Additional park buildings that are non-contributing resources include a modern gazebo and a restroom dating to the 1980s.

Description

The Lakeport Carnegie Library is set within Library Park, a 2.50-acre (approximate) parcel situated on the western shore of Clear Lake which composes the parcel's eastern boundary. The parcel is additionally bounded by Third Street (north) First Street (south) and Park Street (west). The library building is centered on the western boundary and fronts on Park Street. The Lakeport Carnegie Library building is a good example of the Classical Revival Type C style architecture. The single-story building with basement is rectangular in plan and measures 28 feet by 52 feet. The building is surfaced with plaster and is covered by a hipped roof sheathed in asphalt shingles. The cornice is embellished with curved modillians. The symmetrically designed building has a central entrance accessed by a short flight of concrete steps with wide concrete block railings. The oversized primary entrance is a fourteen light door surrounded by decorate plasterwork. One over one wood-sash windows are symmetrically grouped in three on the all façade walls.

Mature landscaping surrounding the library building includes palm trees flanking the entrance and flowering shrubbery. Park grounds are dotted with mature trees and contain playgrounds and picnic tables. A modern concrete walking path follows the shoreline.

Alterations to the building are minimal. The original basement level door and access stairs (south wall) were replaced with a metal door and new access stairs. An additional basement level entry door accessed by concrete steps with metal railings was added to the building's northwest corner circa 1950. The building is currently vacant.

Summary

The Lakeport Carnegie Library meets the National Register of Historic Places Multiple Property Submission, California Carnegie Libraries within the context of "Carnegie Library Development in California and the Architecture It Produced, 1899-1921." The Lakeport Carnegie Library meets the Multiple Property Submission, California Carnegie Libraries registration requirements under Criterion A, in the area of social history. Andrew Carnegie and the Carnegie Corporation provided funding for 1,681 public library buildings in 1,412 U.S. communities between 1889 and 1923. This philanthropy had a great impact on the growth of public library development in the United States. Free public libraries supported by local taxation had begun with Boston in 1849 and slowly spread throughout the country. Mr. Carnegie also attached two conditions to his offer of money for a public library building - the local community had to provide a suitable site and formally agree to continuously support the library through local tax funds. The Lakeport Carnegie Library also meets the Multiple Property Submission, California Carnegie Libraries registration requirements under Criterion C, in the area of architecture. Lakeport Carnegie Library is identified in the Multiple Property Submission, California Carnegie Libraries as one of the thirty-two Classical Revival Type C California Carnegies completed between 1903 and 1921 and is one of the twenty-three still extant. The property is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places at the local level of significance.

History of the Lakeport Carnegie Library

The siting of the Lakeport Carnegie Library is an episode in Lake County history that is an integral part of the role this building has played in the development of the Lakeport community as documented in an account given by L. J. Shuman, written in March, 1950, and published in the February 1988 issue of the Lake County Historical Society's *Pomo Bulletin* is included as follows:

"In the year 1914, the Yolo (County) Water and Power Company was proposing to impound the waters of Clear Lake to an elevation of no more than ten feet above the Government low water mark. White & Co., Investment Bankers of New York, were the financial agents of the water company. (The County of Lake had previously sold the water rights to Clear Lake, in Lake County, to the Yolo Water and Power Company.)

It was thought at the time that it would be good business for the company to build a dredger for future general operations in and around Clear Lake. Also at that time the Napa and Lakeport Railroad was proposing to build into Lake County; they

claimed to own a strip of land in front of Lakeport on which it was proposed to build a depot. They contacted the water company to dredge a fill in front of the Town for a depot site. The company agreed to do this work under certain conditions, which is hereafter outlined:

The company (Yolo) was acquiring water rights around the lake and when it came to acquiring these rights to overflow the properties in front of the Town of Lakeport, it was confronted with two questions; first, should these rights be acquired by purchase and condemnation, or, second, fill in the water front by dredger building a levee and back of this by filling with a section pump. This second plan was adopted on the condition property holders along the waterfront would cooperate to help the project along. Engineers of the water company drew up plans outlining this operation in detail.

This plan, provided among other things, that a Public Park be created between First and Third streets; that the property holders between these streets, deed to the Town of Lakeport, for Public Park purposes, without charge the east 202 feet of their lots including in this 202 feet, an 80 foot street (now called Park Street) provided White & Co., at their own cost and expense would fill this property by dredger. It was further agreed, in this connection, that the City Council would abandon Second Street from the lake to the west side of Park (Street).

"It is to be noted that in conveying the deed for Park Purposes, the property owners inserted in the deed of conveyance this clause: <u>the right given to the Town of</u> <u>Lakeport to erect a Public Library.</u>

"It is fitting here to mention the property holders who were public spirited enough to convey and gift a portion of their property to the Town. They were the Farmers Savings Bank; the Bank of Lake; the Whitten heirs and A. (Aaron) Levy. ...

"Most of the above incidents happened during the years 1914, 1915, 1916, and 1917 and later. The fill for the park took much longer than anticipated...

"For years prior to 1916, public spirited citizens had kept up and maintained a private library for the community among whom was Mrs. Kate White, the later became the first librarian of the Carnegie Library....

"The writer of this short history lays claim to instituting the first steps to interest the Carnegie Foundation in donating funds for the community for a Public Library. This was done through Mr. A. S. White, of the firm of White & Co. of New York. On one of his trips east Mr. Roy Pike, President of the Yolo Water and Power Company sent a telegram to this writer, on Oct. 31, 1914, reading as follows:

Mr. White through some close associate has been working for the Lakeport Library with the Carnegie people, as per your request. We are confidentially advised today that the library will be granted but will not have matter in definite

writing for some days. If there are any enlargements or additions to be considered, this is the time to take them up. Advise me by wire. Expect leave here Sunday. Best greetings. ROY M. PIKE

The writer replied to this telegram as follows:

Roy M. Pike, A. S. White, 30 Pine Street; New York. If other library data needed will gladly forward same. Please convey Mr. White sincere thanks of trustees for his efforts in our behalf. L. J. SHUMAN

November 25th, 1914, a letter was received from the Carnegie Foundation of New York stating that they would donate to the City of Lakeport the sum of \$8000 with which to erect a Carnegie Free Public Library. This in accordance with the request which the writer had made as President of the Library Board.

In the meantime work was proceeding in dredging in the lake fill for the park and library.

On December 6th, 1914 received form of a resolution from the Carnegie Foundation which was to be officially adopted by the Lakeport Town Council and executed by the Mayor and Town Clerk in which the Town agreed to raise by taxation, each year, a sum at least equal to 10% of the cost of the Library building. The building cost slightly in excess of \$8000. This resolution was presented to the Town Council, by this writer, and by the Council officially adopted and forwarded to the Carnegie Foundation in New York City.

No definite action was taken to erect this building until the middle of July 1917, due to the condition of the fill not being sufficiently dry on which to erect the building.

In June of 1917 bids were called for and on July 10th, 1917 these bids were opened and the lowest of these went to Hinds & Randolph, Contractors. However their bid was in excess of \$8000. F. H Boggs, then Mayor telegraphed the Carnegie people stating the situation and asking permission to make some changes in the plans to which a favorable reply was received. However with certain changes made the cost was still \$500 in excess of the Carnegie gift. The writer and the Library Board deposited this amount with the Town Council and the Contractors were awarded to go ahead with the building. It was reported around that the Yolo Water Company paid this sum of \$500. Neither White & Co. nor the Water Company, nor ROY M. PIKE paid not one penny of this amount. The contract was awarded to Hinds & Randolph on Sept. 5th, 1917 and the building was completed early in the year of 1918.

Had it not been for the determination of a few Public spirited citizens of this community, Lakeport would never have had a beautiful Public Park and a Library building of which we can all be proud – two of the most popular places in the community. These will stand, for the future, while those who opposed will have long been forgotten. L. J. Shuman

The "Clear Lake Library Association" was formed as the Library Club by the Ladies Town Improvement Club (forerunner of the Lakeport Women's Civic Club in 1906. This group instituted the movement to provide "a good circulating library of from 500 to 1,000 books for home use, to furnish valuable reference books for use of students, and maintain a reading room for country people waiting in town or strangers visiting here." An account of this group's involvement with and dedication to the concept of a public library is described in an article in the Lake County Historical Society's *Pomo Bulletin*, February 1988 by Marion Geoble who was the County Historian at that time. Mrs. Geoble concludes with:

"Following the creation of the Town Park and the construction of the Carnegie Library, the Improvement Club apparently changed its name to the Lakeport Woman's Civic Club, which was organized March 9, 1921, and continued on with their program of civic improvements, beautification, landscaping, and funding for books for the library.

Within a two years span, the Woman's Civic Club had planted two blocks of street planting in front of the Library, and worked for a permanent bathing beach for the children. Trees and shrubs were planted during the years, and a large rose garden, that still has many of the original roses today. (1988)

The forerunners and the Carnegie Library served the population well for 80 years, and in 1986 a beautiful new library was completed and opened on High Street, Lakeport. From quarters covering about 100 square feet (in the Levy Building), to the Carnegie Library of 1,513, not including the above ground basement, to the new Lakeport Library containing 10,380 square feet of floor space – from the proud offering to the public of 500 books in 1906 to in excess of 66,000 books on file and the circulation of 200,000 books annually, plus the more than 100 years of Lake County Newspapers that have now been microfilmed and available for the use of the public in research, genealogy or general information. A truly amazing record of public service so graciously given to all."




