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The Maywood Woman's Club is a small, one-story bungalow that sits on a landscaped 50'x130' lot in Corning. The clubhouse was built in 1910, in a cross-shaped plan. The building is clad in stucco and has a gable roof covered in asphalt shingles. The roof originally had wood shingles. Although somewhat altered, the building retains sufficient integrity for Register listing.

The most prominent features of the building are its many multi-paned wood casement windows covering almost all wall surfaces. Also prominent is the south-facing gable on the facade, where over the windows is the original 1910 terra cotta emblem of the American Woman's League.

Changes from the original clubhouse have been to move the front door from the south side to the east side of the porch. Metal railings have been added to the front and back porch steps. The original brick foundation has been reinforced with concrete.

Inside the clubhouse above the fireplace along the west wall is the plaque symbolic of the American Woman's League "Woman's Mission" sculpted by Hungarian artist George Julian Zolany, the director of the Art Academy in University City, Missouri. It shows a woman seated with a large book on her knees, teaching two children to read. The original plaque was bronze, but years ago it was painted beige with a dark border.

Other changes inside the clubhouse have been to add a bathroom, update the kitchen, add paneling to the walls, install acoustical tile ceilings, install a tile floor, and install a gas heater and a cooling unit. NPS Form 10-900-a (86-86)

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For more than eighty years, the Maywood Woman's Club building has served the women of Corning in their efforts to gain the vote for women and to improve the community in which they lived. The two organizations associated with the building, the American Woman's League and the Maywood Woman's Club, used the talents of local women to promote worthy causes and achieve a number of civic improvements in such areas as education, parks and recreation, and youth activities.

The American Woman's League was a national organization founded in 1908 in St. Louis, Missouri by Edward Gardner Lewis. The AWL chapter houses, built in three classes or sizes, were originally branches of the Peoples University City of Missouri. Built mainly for the education of women, the buildings housed correspondence classes from the University. Politics and government were often discussed as the League members worked toward suffrage. The AWL had thirty eight local chapters throughout the U.S.

The Corning branch of the League was established in July, 1909 by Mrs. Arvilla C. DeLuce, the chapter's first president. Warren N. Woodson, founder of Corning, and his wife Florence, donated the lots for the construction of the chapter house. The building was constructed in 1910, the first of three built in California. The others were in Compton and Los Angeles.

The Corning branch of the AWL, known as the L.B. Tebbetts Chapter, worked for women's suffrage until 1912, when California women gained the right to vote. (The vote for women was not gained nationally until 1920 with the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment to the Constitution.) With the demise of the local AWL, the building continued to be used by the women of Corning as the new home of the Maywood Woman's Club. The Club had been organized in October of 1898. The name "Maywood" came from Warren Woodson's real estate venture, the Maywood Colony, that was the origin of the town of Corning. The Club had built a clubhouse in 1903, but sold it in 1912 when they moved into the vacant AWL building.

Just after it organized, the Women's Club worked on a number of local improvement projects, and continued their efforts after moving into the new building. In 1901 the group worked toward obtaining a city park. Land was donated by Woodson and his partner Foster, and in 1910 the Woman's Club paid for seats, tables and swings in the park. Other outdoor recreation projects included support for Corning's river park improvements and efforts to save the redwoods. Fundraising for reforestation began in the 1920s and continues today.

Education has been another area of focus for the club. Due to the efforts of the Maywood Woman's Club members, the first high school was built in 1903. In 1918 members campaigned vigorously for an elementary

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school. Bonds to build the school passed three to one. The club started a library in their building which became the nucleus of the city's public library, a Carnegie, which opened in 1914. The club continues to stress education, offering a scholarship to a Corning high school graduating senior each year. Personal education and improvement are emphasized through a regular monthly program of speakers on various topics of interest to the community.

Maywood Woman's Club members have also helped foster better health care by organizing the local blood bank in 1952. Support for the blood bank is still ongoing. Also in the 1950s the club furnished a room at the new Memorial Hospital in Corning. The hospital also received its flagpole and plaque from the club.

Through the years Maywood Woman's Club has sponsored the Campfire Girls, the Cub Scouts, Brownies, Corning Junior Woman's Club, Corning Friends of the Library, and the Corning Museum Association. It is still a vital contributor to community life. (However, since exceptional significance has not been justified, the period of significance has been ended at 1942, fifty years ago.)
