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Pecue House, Baton Rouge, East Baton Rouge Parish, LA

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The Pecue House (1930) is a one-and-a-half story brick residence in the Tudor Revival style. It is located on a corner lot in Kleinert Terrace, a subdivision established in 1927, and has been little altered since construction.

Although referred to by architectural historians as Tudor Revival, the style in question is eclectic, borrowing from Tudor, Elizabethan and Jacobean architecture. Characteristics associated with the style present in the Pecue House include:

- (l) picturesque massing accomplished by multiple steeply pitched gables (5), two prominent multi-flue chimneys with decorative brickwork and chimneypots, and a wall dormer on the facade. As is typical of the style, the facade is dominated by a steeply pitched gable with a superimposed gabled entrance. Also typical are the "catslide" roofs of the front gable and one side gable. Their exaggerated asymmetry contributes greatly to the intended picturesque effect.
- (2) an arched doorway (in this case, recessed) outlined by contrasting bricks and concrete voussoirs
 - (3) bands of tall narrow windows (facade and west side)
 - (4) simulated diamond pattern leaded glass in some of the windows
- (5) an arched mantel and plaster cornices with intricate designs reminiscent of those popular in Tudor, Elizabethan and Jacobean architecture, including strapwork and variations on the Tudor rose.

Other noteworthy features include ornamental cast concrete panels and a planter box, a Palladian motif window on the eastern side elevation, tapestry brick veneer which in two gables is laid in a diamond pattern, solid wood doors on the interior, various arched openings throughout the house, another intricately decorated arched mantel, largely intact bathrooms (including most of the fixtures), and built-in milk and trash receptacles on the exterior. Assessment of Integrity:

The Pecue House is very well preserved, with changes confined to the following:

- (1) A staircase was added to the rear hall by the present owners to provide access to what was then a completely unfinished attic. One room in the attic was finished off.
- (2) The kitchen was remodeled by the present owners. This involved removing a wall between a small breakfast room and the kitchen to make one large room. The original built-in cabinets in this wall were saved and moved to another location in the kitchen.
- (3) A carport was added to the east side at the rear and a latticework covered area to the west side.
 - (4) Aluminum awnings were added to a few of the windows.
 - (5) One of the arched mantels was painted to resemble marble.

The above alterations are small in number, minor or relatively minor in nature, and do not obscure the house's many Tudor Revival characteristics.

Contributing Element

Located to the rear and side of the house is a contemporaneous one story brick garage with a rear servant/guest house wing.

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The Pecue House is locally significant in the area of architecture because it is a superior example of the Tudor Revival style within Kleinert Terrace Subdivision.

Subdivisions such as Kleinert Terrace represent the early twentieth century expansion of Baton Rouge eastward from the Mississippi River. This period of urban growth was fueled by the establishment and growth of various petro-chemical industries, the most important being a huge Standard Oil plant. The city's first subdivision, Roseland Terrace, was established in 1911. Others, such as Kleinert Terrace, followed in the 1920s.

Platted in 1927, Kleinert Terrace's earliest development coincided with the popularity of the so-called "period look" -- i.e., the revival of various historic styles, among them, the English cottage look, or Tudor Revival as it is known by architectural historians. Of the roughly 200 houses in Kleinert Terrace, there are fifteen examples of the Tudor Revival influence. Most of these are small low-key examples which could best be described as featuring hesitant touches of the style. Only the Pecue House and four others could be termed major examples because of their consistent and fully developed articulation. The architect designed Pecue House is among this group of landmarks largely because of its picturesque massing, the hallmark of the style. With five steeply pitched gables (two of which have "catslide" roofs), prominent chimneys, and a wall dormer, the Pecue House's massing is matched by only one other Tudor Revival house.


