DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Six structures, four of them connecting but constructed at different times, make up the property contained in the Porter Leath Home. The northernmost building, built in 1923, is of red brick, has a gable roof, and rectangular double hung windows. To the south of the 1923 structure is the original building built in 1856. It is a brick, two-story building with a hip roof. Rectangular double hung windows are topped by cast iron caps. A brick chimney is at the rear of the building.

The largest building, which is a three-story brick, was built in 1875. The architect was E. C. Jones. Segmental arched windows are centered with keystone arches. A porte cochere at the main entry extends over the drive, supported by rectangular wooden columns. A three-story bay window, located at the front of the building, has a carved stone at the second story cornice bearing the legend "Leath Orphanage, Erected I.O.O.F., 1875". There are six brick chimneys, three centrally located and two at the rear of the structure. A projecting cornice just below the roofline of the building is supported by exposed cornice brackets. The termination of each of the three stories is marked by brick cornice work with elaborate brick piers.

To the south of the three-story building, connected by a walkway, is a two-story rectangular brick structure built in 1912. Brick quoins appear at each corner of the building and rectangular double-hung windows are topped by cornice work with a centered keystone.

The southernmost building in the complex is the Gould Cottage, built in 1927 with funds provided by Edwin Gould of New York. The Gould Cottage is a two-story building of white stucco with a tiled roof, and other elements of the Spanish Mission style. The centered entry is recessed and is marked by a brick and limestone enclosed archway with an elaborate motif of limestone. The hip roof of the structure is matched by a projecting roof overhang at the top of the first floor. A gable appears on the second story to the right of the entry.

The remaining building in the complex is a one-story brick building with a flat roof, rectangular windows, and an overhanging porch supported by rectangular wooden ports. This structure is not currently in use.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Porter Leath Children's Center was originally chartered in 1850 as the Protestant Widows' and Orphans' Asylum, the oldest institution of its kind in Memphis. The asylum was incorporated in 1852. The present location of the institution was first utilized in 1854, when Mrs. Sarah H. Leath donated <u>nine</u> acres of land for the use of the institution. At that time, public subscriptions were accepted for the construction of the first building (architect unknown), which was completed in 1856 and is still standing. Mrs. Leath's gift resulted in a name change for the institution to the Leath Orphan Asylum.

In 1875, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of Memphis provided funds for the erection of a three-story brick building, still standing to the south of the original 1856 building. The architect of this Italianate structure was Edward Culliatt Jones, who began his career in 1848 in Charleston, South Carolina, where he gained a statewide reputation. Although his early work was done in the Greek Revival style, he began to employ the Italian Villa style in 1852 in conjunction with his partner Francis D. Lee. By 1866 Jones had arrived in Memphis, where he was one of three architects in the mid and late nineteenth century who designed the major public, private and commercial buildings in the city. Among the buildings that he designed were the <u>Avalanche</u> office, the residences of Napoleon Hill, J. C. Neely, R. A. Parker, John S. Toof and S. T. Carnes, the <u>Appeal</u> building, the Lauderdale Street Prebyterian Church, First Street Baptist Church, Mammoth Cotton Shed at the Navy Yard and many public schools.

The architectural distinction of the building that Jones designed symbolizes the commitment of those who financed construction to translate a growing social conscience into social action. That building activity of this sort was a priority of the community indicates the thrust of contemporary values.

A gift in memory of Dr. David Tinsley Porter of Memphis in 1904 prompted a name change to the Porter Home and Leath Orphanage. In 1951, the name was again changed to the Porter Leath Home.

An addition in 1912 resulted in a south wing being added to the 1875 structure. A further addition was made to the north of the first structure in 1923. The last physical addition to the complex was begun in 1927 with the proceeds of a gift from Edwin Gould of New York, related to the railroad king Jay Gould. This addition is called the Gould Cottage and was originally used as a home for older girls. The architects for these structures are not known.

Throughout its history, the Porter Leath Children's Center has changed its
