Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Unity Baptist Church (1910) is located at the intersection of Hart and Sumter Streets in the small town of Kershaw in southern Lancaster County. It is significant as an example of an intact, frame, vernacular vernacular Gothic Revival church built in the early part of the twentieth century by an early black Baptist congregation of the South Carolina upcountry. Also being nominated are the church's parsonage and its privy (c. 1922), located on an adjacent lot immediately west of the church.

Additional Information

The church is a one-story, frame, Greek cross plan building covered with wood clapboard siding a stepped brick pier foundation with brick infill. A pent cross-gabled roof with composition shingles covers the building. A four-level square bell tower projects between north and east gables. It contains two double six-panel door pointed transom-light doors on the first level. A skirt roof divides the first and second levels, which have cameo windows with wooden surrounds and keystones. The third level has peaked, arched louvered vents. A molded cornice separates the fourth level and the tower has a pedimented pent cross-gable roof. A continuous cornice is located at the first story level under the pent roofs and bell tower skirt. Windows are typically pointed arch windows with traceried upper windows and two-light lower double-hung sash windows. Double panel doors are in the center of the north projection flanked by single double-sash windows. The south projection has triple pointed arch windows flanked by single double-hung windows, while the east and west exterior sides have single doors with six horizontal panels and pointed arch transom-lights. East and west projections have three pointed arch double-hung sash windows.

The interior is intact with beaded board wainscotting and ceiling. There is a coved ceiling in the sanctuary. The pulpit and choir areas are raised from the floor of the sanctuary. The two areas are denoted by semi-circular projections. The pulpit extends further into the sanctuary than the choir area, which is separated by turned posts and balusters. Original hanging light fixtures still exist in the sanctuary. Two arched openings with paneled pilasters also delineate the pulpit from the choir

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Unity Baptist Church was built in 1910. Its congregation was an outgrowth of Kershaw's First Baptist Church and was the second separate black church established in Kershaw in the early twentieth century. It is significant both as a particularly intact example of Gothic Revival church architecture common in the period and as an example of early twentieth century institutions in Kershaw's black community.

The congregation was organized in November 1909 and originally met in members' homes. It occupied this sanctuary, built by Deacon George L. Shropshire, a local carpenter and contractor, in April 1910. Reverend A.W. Hill, while still a student at Benedict College in Columbia, became Unity's first full-time minister in 1911. His successor, Reverend L.C. Jenkins, was the first pastor to occupy the parsonage adjacent to the church, built c. 1922.(1)

Although the Unity Baptist Church is a religious property, it is remarkably intact, having undergone few alterations since 1910. It is eligible for the National Register under the themes of Architecture and Ethnic Heritage/Black.

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area. This choir area is flanked by two smaller rooms with exterior exits.

Two contributing properties associated with the church are included in the National Register boundaries. The parsonage is a one-story, L-shaped, frame building with clapboard siding and a brick pier foundation. The residence has an asphalt pyramidal roof with a central hipped dormer and gable roof rear ell. The main facade has a central-entry three-bay facade as well as a full-facade hipped-roof porch on the main facade with square posts. An L-shaped porch with replacement metal support is located in the ell. There is also a small front-gable roof privy with vertical plank siding located at the rear of the parsonage.
