DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Courthouse is a three-story building made of native red brick reflecting a plains adaptation of the Italian style. The most telling feature of the building's character is a simple and symetrical window group above the main entrance. This group of three contains two windows and a central door opening on a balcony on the portico. Round headed apertures display little decoration except for radiating voussoirs with keystones. All other windows on the front of the building are double and topped with semi-eliptical surrounds of the same type.

The main doorway is approached by a flight of cement steps and surrounded by a portico with wooden columns of a simple order. The doorway is set away from the building by a short extention supporting a pediment with boxed cornices and decorated frieze above the eves which are also decorated with small arches and brackets. A gablet roof covers the original building.

Two wings added in 1915 do follow the theme of the main structure but with less decoration.

A winding staircase connects the second and third floors. The grounds are surrounded by a hedge and contain flower beds and spruce trees.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			

Built in Dakota Territory in 1881, the Custer County Courthouse represented a transitional period between lawless, uncertain gold rush days and more civilized and traditional commercial ways of life, an important theme in Black Hills history. Its construction marked the arrival of political and social stability to an area that only four years earlier had been considered the wildest in the country.

Custer City found a reliable economic base in its designation as county seat. On the court days, sidewalks and stores were packed with miners, stockmen, and farmers either on legal business or in town to watch the spectacular trials. Horse races and other events were sponsored by the city to entertain those crowds. A kind of social tradition developed with the Courthouse as its focal point.

Trials reflected the unsettled nature of a rapidly expanding frontier. Land disputes, robberies, horse and cattle thefts, and stolen mine properties made up a large share of court cases. Custer County also had its share of violent crimes. Most spectacular of these was the killing of the county sheriff by John Blehman in 1891. Brought to trial and convicted of murder, Blehman became the first victim of capital punishment in the state. It was not the first hanging in the area or even in the city, but it did have the sanction of a recognized legal system and was at least more just than the vigilanti executions of previous years.

The Custer County Courthouse has served as a local political center for 21 years. Its career will end in the spring of 1973 when a new courthouse is completed. Its downtown location and proximity to an historical park make the Courthouse an excellent prospect for adaptive uses either commercial or historical. The local historical society is interested in preserving the building as a monument to the pioneer's and the history of the development of the Black Hills.
