19. History <u>Eubank was a Revolutionary, representative in the state legislature (1799-1800). Deed dates from 1793. Achilles Eubank came from Bedford County, VA: first traveled to Kentucky in 1777 with Boone; came here to settle after 1781; was county judge sheriff; served in War of 1812; died in 1830. "G. Significance <u>Revolutionary War soldier, local sheriff and state representative (1799-1800), Achilles Eubank came from Bedford County, Virginia to Clark County, where he purchased this land in 1793. Nineteen years later he built this Federal detailed house in Flemish bond with a hall parlor plan and an off-center doorway, which somewhat disrupts</u> (over)		35. the classical symmetry. The Eubank House is part of the Two Mile Creek area of settlement, which was one of the half dozen early creekbed settlements in Clark. The house is the best example of the relatively rare two story, hall-parlor plan federal house in the county.
